Cheviot Bridge Yarra Valley Cabernet Merlot 2003

was \$15.95 now \$12.95

A superb Cab/Merlot blend, from one of Australia's premium viticultural regions, with all the detail and finesse that you'd expect from this slightly less-than-mainstream producer. It has overarching dark berry/cherry notes, a stream of warm chocolate and cassis flavours and a palate that runs like a river. Revered wino journo Huon Hook says in the Sydney Morning Herald: 'These wines just over-deliver at the price point.'

Hanging Rock Merlot 2004

was \$16.95 now \$12.95

'And now we're solid, solid as a rock ... ' remember that pseudo-falsetto that stung the ears in the 80's? Anyway, this is indeed rocksolid, a spicy, soft, well-structured little guy that is ready to go from the get-go. So ripe and ready it'll give you veeeeeertigoooo, which being from vineyards around Mt Jim Jim would seem to be bang on, surely? Cherries and plums, a shred of nutmeg, a tinge of oak, a tonne of flavour. A no-brainer, really: it's really good, and not very expensive. Do the math.

Goldwater Roseland Marlborough Chardonnay 2004

was \$19.95 now \$15.95

Ooh but they're good, them Goldwaters? Huh? This is a treat, all cascading flavours and aromas of nectarines, peaches and rock melons, in descending order, of course. The oak doesn't dominate but it's no shrinking, er rose, either, mingling seductively with some malo creaminess to give up rich, butterscotch notes to support the fruit. A swig of figs and a taut, well-defined palate suggest drink now, cellar some, and enjoy greatly at this price.



Te Awa Farm Longlands Hawkes Bay Chardonnay 2004



The farmers at Te Awa have strung together an enviable career crafting superb, solid and great value wines from their rather fab bits of dirt down The Bay way. This offering from the highly productive '04 vintage is juicily appealing, with plenty of fresh stonefruit flavours and a clever minerality that says these guys know their terroir from their Torana. It doesn't sacrifice richness for freshness though, bursting forth with opulent, ultra-ripe pure fruit, a gentle nod in the oak direction and a clean, long and utterly smart finish.

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
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French Champagne turning up on the shelves at your local dairy for \$5.99 is no reflection on the brand concerned. The Grand Marques do all they can to control who they sell their precious wine to, but they can do little about what happens from there on in. Whatever the case, someone along the line purchases a container or two of a famous brand and, due to the more relaxed importing regulations in NZ, brings it on in.

Now, as they are not the recognised distributor, they follow none of the rules and guidelines that a genuine importer must. Also, of course, they receive no marketing support, and as such compete solely on price.

No big deal so far, perhaps. But the biggest problem from acting independently from the mother ship is that a parallel importer ships, stores and sells the wines as, and when he/she pleases. For you the consumer, this means that there are no guarantees.

We ship the freshest Pol Roger, and other champagnes, direct from France, and should there be any problem with the wine, you can come straight back to us and we will replace it.

How long has that parallel imported stock been on the shelf? When was it bottled? How long did it take to get here? Wine is a living, breathing thing and needs to be handled with care; champagne even more so. Your chances of a dodgy bottle climb markedly when buying PI stock.

Most of us don't drink Champagne every day; it is a special occasion wine. How special will that occasion be if you rip open the cage and ease the cork on the bottle that you saved maybe ten bucks on, only to find it flat, or oxidised or just not very nice? 'Buyer beware' has never been so important.

Still on a sparkling note, we have noted that many more of you have been purchasing champagne and with Christmas coming up, we figured we'd bring in even more variety than usual. Monique and Liz had the torturous task of sipping a few new wines while in the Champagne region and, to that end, we have arriving in early November Champagne Drappier, which we showcase in this wineletter along with your favourites. And if you think this lot is good (and they are), wait till next month: we confidently predict we will bring you the best deals on the greatest champagne range in New Zealand.

Pol Roger glows as a unique star in the Champagne firmament. In a global environment of corporate mergers, aggressive acquisitions and the commoditising of every brand you care to think about, this renowned house remains one of the very few Grand Marques that remains in family hands. That doesn't mean that Champagne houses whose owners also oversee the production of, say, leather goods can't produce great wines; have a look at the wines we have on offer this month and that becomes very clear. But there is something indefinable about the fantastic wines from Pol Roger. Their consistency, their generosity, their finesse, all qualities that have been finely-honed and rigorously stuck to over years and years in the deep caves that run beneath the family estate.

And Christian Pol-Roger, who visits these shores frequently, embodies everything that his family's wines stand for. Elegant, unruffled, dignified yet cheekily playful, the man and the wine are so intertwined that each gives a unique snapshot of the other. And of the 1998 wines that we have just landed, Christian tells us that he considers them to be even finer than the '96's. Anyone who tasted the latter will know that's a huge claim for the former. Anyone, and there are a lot of you, who count Pol Roger as 'their champagne' will be as eager as we were to untwist the cages on the '98 and unleash the ecstasy.

And if you want an independent endorsement, try champagne aficionado Tom Stevenson: 'The three Pol Rogers (Brut Chardonnay, Brut Vintage, Brut Rosé) represent the best trio of 1998's I have tasted in Champagne.' High praise indeed.



Pol Roger Brut Vintage 1998

was \$104:00 now \$95.95

A beautiful, golden-coloured Champagne from a season that started slowly, but ended in a spell of fine weather that delivered well balanced grapes. It has a dense, persistent stream of tiny bubbles and a complex, multi-layered bouquet that displays raisin-like aromas intermingling with toasty, mealy characters. It is beautifully balanced and elegant, with ample fleshy fruit flavours enhanced by a mouthfilling mousse and supported by refreshing, lingering citrus notes. Classy.



Pol Roger Chardonnay Vintage 1998

A classic Blanc de Blanc produced entirely from Chardonnay selected from Grand Cru-rated Côte des Blancs vineyards. To retain the fruit character of the Chardonnay, Pol Roger used only first run juice, which was fermented in temperature-controlled stainless steel tanks. Made only in small quantities, the wine was matured for seven years in the company's cellars before it was released. It has a vivacious mousse and a wonderfully-balanced nutty bouquet. The crisp, fruity palate is deliciously elegant and long flavoured. A superb aperitif.

Pol Roger Sir Winston Churchill Cuvée 1995

was \$225.00 now \$199.95

Created as a tribute to Sir Winston Churchill, this is exceptional value for a Prestige Cuvée, considering the hands-on effort that goes into its production. Unfortunately Sir Winston, who is reputed to have ordered 500 cases in his last ten years of life, died before the wine was launched in 1975; but he would have approved and probably ordered a pallet. Produced with fastidious attention to detail, it is exceptional, robust and full bodied. The blend is dominated by Pinot Noir drawn from the very best vineyards. Top of the line from a house possessing an abundance of superb wines.

While Stonyridge Vineyards on Waiheke Island have gained a worldwide reputation over the last couple of decades for producing magnificent claret-styled reds, there is also quite a following for another commodity of theirs which, like the red, seems all too scarce, a notion augmented by the fact that as soon as you've had one, well, you kinda want another. Enter their 'Fallen Angel' parties, which have become rather legendary. So much so that when it came time to coin a name for the new range of wines produced by Stonyridge, well, 'FA' had the right ring to it.

These are classic wine styles from New Zealand's, and the world's, best regions, produced in co-operation with top viticulturists and winemakers, with the aim of passionately showing off the variety, its terroir and its regional characteristics. The creative whizzes at Stonyridge oversee all the crucial parts of the winemaking process, thus broadening their experience while providing us all with more available, happy supping. Indeed, with the wait between drinks (of Larose) seeming unbearable even for the patient, this range of wines ensures that Stonyridge can keep you happy on a more frequent basis.

G Fallen Angel Marlborough Riesling 2004

\$25.95

A breathless trip through a blossom-filled orchard, with seductive intense aromas of white flowers, crisp citrus and warm, ripe stonefruit. The style is deliberately off-dry, the palate a rich and enticing exercise in acid/sweetness, the former tantalising the senses, the latter injecting a component described in better dictionaries as 'moreish.' As you'd expect from Stonyridge, the whole beautiful picture is framed with the utmost finesse, gorgeous fruit and floral characters delivered right to your door with an intensity and concentration that charms now but will deliver riches for the patient.

Waipara Hills

Waipara Chardonnay 2004



The fruit for this darling was grown by Lord Tom Clifford, natch, so no surprises that it has aristocratic leanings. A rich, nay opulent offering with a warm, unctuous, toasty creaminess from its twelve month stretch in French oak, while the fruit, old bean, is a dizzying array of peaches and orange-tinted lemons. You could say marmalade, which is the great aristocratic breakfast spread, so it's totally apropos. Pip, pip.

Waipara Pinot has been nipping at the heels of the more high profile regions for some time now. Applying Alan McCorkindale's legendary skills and experience to top flight fruit was always going to make for a winner, and this is. Only seriously good fruit could survive, let alone prosper in new French oak for 14 months and, well, hasn't it just? Immensely concentrated, richly complex and beautifully crafted, this will continue to open up and delight for a good few years yet.

This is a beauty, with a heady 14% alcohol and a slickly seductive 7.1% residual sugar. So, no compromises then, with loads of luscious texture and weight, and a palate that gushes warmth, charm and flavour. More Euro than Marlbo-ro, the aromas are intensely floral and citric, the flavours likewise and while it gives up much satisfaction at this very moment, put it away and you will be richly rewarded by the Riesling gods.

There are few experiences so uniquely scintillating as that first Sauvignon of the new vintage. And it's such a uniquely New Zealand experience, which just makes it all the more pleasurable. When the vintage has been as good as 2005 turned out to be, the joy is all the greater, for Sauvignon Blanc is a variety that, as any winemaker worth their woollen socks will tell you, is made in the vineyard. No wine has all its bits on display like a new Sauvignon; any imperfections will stand out like, well, you know the rest. And so we have a collection of the brightest young things from 2005, our geographical spatula pulling 'em in (mostly) from worldfamous Marlborough. If you thought those waifs parading down the walks at Fashion Week had it all going on, wrap your laughing gear around these beauties. Seduction never tasted better.

Goldwater Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc 2005

was \$19.95 now \$16.95

With summer almost on our doorstep, it's time to put away the comfort foods and start looking forward to lighter fare, and that needs a wine that has the verve to match the likes of shellfish and salads. Goldwater's 2005 Sauvignon fits the bill beautifully. Fresh and racy, it has an impressive aromatic profile that sings of passionfruit, gooseberry with hints of melon and lime. The palate opens with a pure blast of fruit flavours that gallop through to a bracingly clean, refreshing finish. Wonderful by itself, as an aperitif.

Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc 2005



A cool start to the 2005 Marlborough vintage resulted in lower-cropping yields, but good brix and flavour levels, and harvesting was, on average, two weeks later than normal. This wine is a blend from six selected Marlborough vineyards, including the company's own Falcon and Quarry vineyards. It is a fruit-driven, shimmering yellow-green wine, with upfront apple and gooseberry aromas and gentle herbaceous notes. Lively and vibrant, with distinctive, lifted, ripe fruit characters, a slight gun flint edge and a fresh, lingering finish.

Kim Crawford Beacon Hill Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc 2005

ECHAU



The soil structure of Marlborough's Beacon Hill Vineyard has a higher clay component than is the norm for the region. This provides a full spectrum of Sauvignon Blanc flavours that range from the classic Marlborough herbaceous to passionfruit and tropical fruit. The wine was made in small parcels from grapes from Beacon Hill's first crop. It is a dramatically-styled wine, with bold celery and green pepper aromas. The palate is well focused and nicely balanced, with an abundance of varietal characters, a smooth mid-palate and a fresh finish.



Fairhall Downs

Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc 2005

was \$19.95 now \$16.95

Ken and Jill Small planted their first 8ha hectare vineyard in 1982 in the Fairhall River Valley, but did not release their first Sauvignon Blanc until 1996. Their patience paid off, and since that first release, Fairhall's savvies have been consistent award winners. This is a classy, single estate wine made with consummate skill. The nose shows tropical fruit aromas underpinned by herbaceous, citrus characters. The palate is well balanced and generously flavoured, displaying lovely pineapple and melon flavours enhanced by mineral nuances and a limey freshness.

2004 WITH AGE COMES FINESSE

Oh yes, yes, yes, drink young, they say (about Sauvignon, of course) but, as they also say, the only rule is that there are no rules. The bigger, braver more complex styles actually benefit from a bit of bottle age, their acidic edge just softening up a bit with the pass ing of time, their myriad components becoming a more rounded whole as they lurk under your stairs/desk/where e'er your cellar may be. Try these wines against some of the '05's and, lo and behold, you'll be able to predict the future, getting the perfect clue as to why a little bit of lying around can be a good thing. Flavour development, seamless integration and balance are the rewards for your patience, along with the fact you can smugly announce to guests that the 04's are rapidly selling out, and only you had the nous to keep some. You star.

Ti Point Sauvignon Blanc 2004

was \$19.95 now \$16.95

Additional bottle ageing has given this wine a new dimension. It still has that typical, bold Marlborough aromatic definition, but the herbaceous characters are more subdued, while the tropical fruit flavours are more dominant. The wine now shows greater palate weight and a mid-palate smoothness that complements the generous gooseberry, melon and pineapple flavours. Beautifully structured and nicely balanced, it still has plenty of verve and is extremely food-friendly.

Goldwater New Dog Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc 2004



New Dog Sauvignon Blanc was sealed with a screw cap; to some, not as glamorous as ye olde corke, but as this wine so magnificently demonstrates, the seal has delivered everything that the manufacturer promised. The wine has developed very well, and it is as beautifully fresh as the day it was bottled. The lees stirring which gave the wine a hint of butteriness in its youth is fully integrated with ripe tropical fruit aromas and flavours. It is now a wine with greater depth and an elegant mouthfeel. Nga Waka Martinborough Sauvignon Blanc **2004**



Successive vintages of this wine have been awarded 90-plus marks by leading magazines such as Wine & Spirits and Wine Spectator. A hallmark of Nga Waka's Sauvignon Blanc has been fruit concentration and intensity, attributes that allow the wine to develop in the bottle. This 2004 version is in that mould, and with bottle age it has developed more complex integrated aromas and flavours. It is a fresh wine, distinguished by a spectrum of tropical fruit aromas and flavours and a smooth mouthfeel, balanced by a lime-influenced finish.

Stony Batter Road Works Waiheke Island Sauvignon Blanc 2004

was \$26.95 now \$24.95


The vineyards of Waiheke Island have quite different soil types, and enjoy a warmer climate than those of the southern regions. These two factors play a very important role in the style and flavour of its Sauvignon Blancs. While they have that undeniable tangy character, they are less pungently herbaceous. This wine has really benefited from another year in bottle. The colour is more golden and the distinctive peach, melon and pineapple aromas, flavours and lees influences have integrated significantly. Smooth and well-balanced, it will continue to develop.



Ata Rangi walnut Ridge Martinborough Sauvignon Blanc 2004



Walnut Ridge is made by Ata Rangi, who established their reputation with a succession of opulent, award-winning Pinot Noirs. But the company also produces very classy Sauvignon Blancs, as illustrated by this 2004 release, an elegant, understated style that develops nuances with each sip. The emphasis is on ripe gooseberry and passionfruit aromas and flavours. The palate is fresh and lively, and has a lovely juicy quality, enhanced by a finely-judged lime influence that balances the fruit and gives length to the finish.





Remember Fume Blanc? Well, OK pip squeak, some of us have been around longer than the time it takes to fry an egg. Oak-aged Sauvignon was a big thing locally in the late eighties when, being a decade of extremes, it seemed every man and his Kubota was whacking perfectly good savvy into wood and churning it out for the restaurant trade. These days the oak use is far more judicious, the fruit selected for barrel ageing done on the basis that it will benefit from oak contact (rather than the whimsical 'we oak aged it because we could'), and the result is far and beyond the 'sauvignon for chardonnay drinkers' epithet that sometimes gets thrown at these wines. While they do usually require food to show them at their finest, they are distinctively, varietally Sauvignon Blanc. Just a different expression thereof, and a rather exciting one at that. Try it on for size.

Pegasus Bay

Waipara Sauvignon Semillon 2004

was \$27.95 now \$22.95

An interesting blend of 80% Sauvignon Blanc and 20% Semillon, with both varieties fermented on wild yeasts. The Sauvignon was cool fermented in tank, the Semillon in seasoned oak barriques, and matured on lees to develop weight and complexity prior to blending. It is a strawtinged wine, with the Sauvignon providing refined tropical fruit and spicy aromas and the Semillon expressive lime notes. Nicely weighted and well integrated, it is complemented by subtle oak. An excellent food wine that's drinking well now, but will develop further.



BRAVESTONE



was \$37.95 now \$32.95

Seresin has followed a different path to the majority of New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc producers. This was made from hand-harvested grapes, whole bunch pressed, fermented on indigenous yeasts, initially in tanks, finished in French oak barrels and lees matured for 14 months. It has layers of fig, melon and lime aromas and flavours, supported by spicy oak and nutty nuances. Terrifically structured and balanced, it has a buttery edge and a great, full flavoured finish. Drinking well now, this foodfriendly wine will continue to develop further.





A good example of the 'horses for courses' theory: that grape varieties perform and need to be treated differently to fully express their terroir. Stony Batter, instead making a pungent (Marlborough style) Sauvignon, have produced a barrel fermented wine that has not only benefited from the extra dimension of oak, but has also evolved gracefully with bottle age. Yellow in colour, it has an aromatic, oak-tinged bouquet that hints at peach, guava, and papaya. A beautifully balanced, long, even wine with a supple texture and slight smoky character.

INTERNATIONAL

In Aus, it is really only the cooler climate regions that come anywhere near giving us a run for our money, and even then if you shut your eyes, it could be Marlborough and not the Murray river. The French have a different take, of course ('we started it!' they are wont to cry), with Sancerre tending to be a minerally and more subdued expression than we are used to. The exception to that expression is Didier Dagueneau, who combines Marlborough aggression with French finesse and comes out with possibly the world's most exciting Sauvignon Blanc this side of the Alps. But we still do it better, huh.

> Pascal Jolivet Exception Sancerre Blanc 2002

was \$89.95 now \$79.9541088

This wine compels one to reassess the popular view that Sauvignon should be consumed young. Wine Spectator magazine awarded Exception 92 marks, which means that their tasting panel believed it is 'outstanding, wine of superior character and style.' High praise and truly deserved, because this is a benchmark wine. It is big hearted, with rich layers of integrated gooseberry, mineral, lychee, lemongrass and smoke that develop suppleness and harmony with every sip. It has a sustained, discreet freshness and a finelybalanced, citrus-edged finish.

41090 **Pascal Jolivet** Attitude Sauvignon Blanc 2004 41663 **Château Brown** Bordeaux Blanc 2002



Deakin Estate Sauvignon Blanc 2005

was \$12.95 now \$9.95

This is great summer drinking, and at the price affordable every night of the week; well, maybe a couple of times for the sake of variety, and we do have plenty of other wines that will fit the bill admirably. The Deakin estate-harvested grapes were cool fermented to retain varietal definition. It is a green-tinged wine, with lime-accented apple, pear and scented fruit aromas. It is light bodied, with a vibrant, juicy, fresh palate and deep-seated fruit flavours, balanced by a smart, clean finish.

Pascal Jolivet Sancerre Blanc 2004

was \$38.95 now \$36.95

Pascal Jolivet is a relatively new wine company, at the cutting edge of the Loire, that has led a revival in the wines of Sancerre and Pouilly-sur-Loire. Jolivet wines have gained international recognition for their outstanding quality, and in France, it is a favourite of Michelin-starred restaurants. That is the clue to this wine; it has great affinity with food, in particular Asian and grilled or baked seafood. Medium-bodied, with trademark gooseberry, hints of mineral, a splash of black currant leaves and lovely clean acidity.



was \$91.95 now \$89.95

The '03 Pur Sang (French for thoroughbred) was awarded 92 marks by Wine Spectator, and Robert Parker considers Dagueneau's wines are the best he's ever tasted from Pouilly. Regarded as a renegade, Dagueneau tills his vineyards by horse and has reduced yields by half. This barrel-fermented Sauvignon has a complex bouquet, with honeyed peach and tropical fruit aromas enhanced by mineral and smoky oak nuances. Magnificently structured and balanced, it's packed with delicious fruit flavours that linger on in the refreshing finish.



Wally's Hut SE Australian Shiraz **2004**

was \$11.95 now \$9.95

It's always a bit of a conundrum, really. What wine goes with your favourite take out? This is an issue we have addressed in previous issues, but to cut to the chase and the cashews, this outstanding red from our reliable mate Wal goes screamingly well with Chinese food. You bet. Especially anything that's been near a black bean sauce, or anything with a bit of soy kicking it along. Yip, a plastic pack of dinner, and a bottle of Wal's finest. The best night in since the invention of television.



Villa Maria Riverstone Vintage Selection Chardonnay Chenin Blanc

was \$12.95 now \$9.95

Rather clever, those Villa Marionettes. See, they have done this cheeky little blend for like, ever, and it's as if no one else has noticed how well the two varieties mix. I mean, these kids really get on. There's a gorgeous melon aroma upon unleashing the wee beast, and this follows through to the palate whereupon it gets fresh with some zesty lemon notes. The palate is soft, and smarty-pants use of oak and a touch of malolactic fermentation add enough creaminess to coat a pav. Fantastic.

Angas Brut Premium Cuvée **NV**

was 12.95 now \$9.95

Gourmet Traveller pronounced Angas Brut 'a terrific aperitif-style sparkler for the approaching warmer weather.' Now the cynics amongst you would say, well it might be hotting up in Oz but we don't get summer until February. Oh come on, summer's coming. I've seen it on the streets, dangerously dressed and looking for a boat. And anyway, this delivers such a delight of strawberries and summer apples that you'll be basking in such rapture, nothing will overcast your day.

Her overarching goal was 'a legacy of excellence and the pursuit of perfection' the latter obvious to anyone who has tasted the wines from this indomitable house. Fresh, complex and exquisitely constructed, they carry a flash of the widow's spirit and more than a little of her style and charm. As for the pursuit of perfection: striving for the impossible was never so much fun.

While 'the widow' has a relatively high proportion of Pinot Noir (usually around 50-55%) don't for a second let this lead you to expect to be overwhelmed with weight; this is a wine that elicits that hallmark of great Champagne, balance. It walks a gorgeous line between finesse and force, between fruit (raisins, white peaches) and flowers, between a typical champagne yeastiness and a heavenly bake-off of brioche and fresh loaves. These elements, which, in less assured hands could produce the taste equivalent of a cacophony, meld seamlessly, and seemingly effortlessly to produce an integrated, charming, beautifully crafted wine.



What is so special about Champagne? Champagne just is, you know? Yes, sure it is wine, made from varietals we all know and love when they're still, but something happens in those chalky cellars beneath the ground in cold old France that transmits a magic into this style of wine that truly is, men and women of words that we are, still indescribable. Being on the downhill sled to the festive season, we thought we'd take time out to fill you in on a few of the big house brands and, well, feeling prematurely festive as we are, we've drastically reduced the prices as well.

What can you say about Bollinger? Quite a bit, since you asked, but we'll curb our words and enthusiasm, as the infectious nature of this powerful and seductive wine is known and enjoyed by many. With the first fermentation taking place in small oak barrels, Bollinger immediately marks itself out as a Margue apart from the rest. While this signifies a dedication to detail that hallmarks this house, it also lends the blend its distinctive power. It's a white charger, voluptuous, muscular and beautifully structured with undeniable finesse and balance.

Ayala Brut Non-Vintage

Like Pol Roger, Ayala are a fiercely independent family-owned house, and tradition drives the style of this fine offering from Ay. It's a powerful brut(e), its controlled strength coming from a good proportion of Pinot Noir, while the chardonnay offers finesse and style in equal measure. A refined wine, the style is a noble and aristocratic one, restrained, dignified yet generous, particularly by the second glass. And with a stock of three million bottles under the 'house', there is no chance of our desire for more not being satisfied.




