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

When it comes to the world of wine, a little knowledge is a good thing, and something that we have always encouraged at Glengarry, both in our staff and with the wider public.

Our vehicle for wine education has always been the Glengarry Wine Academy which, since its inception in the early 90's, has provided top flight, no-nonsense wine information to, quite literally, thousands of people in both Auckland and Wellington.

I ducked down to the academy the other night to watch the latest Stage One course in action, delighted to report that it continues to thrive. It is very much a non-intimidatory environment; wine can be a scary thing, no matter what your level of knowledge. Talking to attendees, one of the biggest attractions is that we don't talk down to you, and the necessary knowledge is imparted with humour and passion, using understandable language.

The Wine Academy attracts a huge cross-section of individuals, which not only keeps the course lively, but helps all those involved. I recall sitting in on a session or two a few years ago, and seeing a very well-known and respected winemaker 'having a refresher', as he put it, sitting next to someone who, I swear it's true, had never tasted wine before. To hear that latter person, a few weeks later talking about the 'herbaceous notes in a Sauvignon Blanc' was gratifying, to say the least.

We have Stage 1 courses starting in both Wellington and Auckland in May, so if you're interested in an introduction to wine, want to brush up on your knowledge, or would simply like to immerse yourself in an environment conducive to learning and discussion, and taste upwards of 40 wines, contact us via the numbers listed below, and we will provide details of costs, timing and so forth.

The Stage 2 courses, which have been on a bit of a break, will be up and running from July. This is a 4-week course that delivers an overview of French wine and a sound introduction to the wines of Spain, Italy, Chile, and Portugal, as well as a session on the wonders of Riedel stemware and the difference it makes to wine appreciation. We're aiming to introduce a Stage 3 course by September of this year, which will take a comprehensive look at the great regions of France and Italy and discuss the cellaring of wine.

#### Fairhall Downs Marlborough Pinot Noir 2003

There's so much going for this wine, it'll unquestionably go out the door faster than the sausage rolls at a Parliamentary bash; so a word to the wise: get in quick. 2003 was a good vintage for Marlborough Pinot, and with a couple of years swirling around in the bottle, this has integrated extremely well without losing any of its panache. Expect punchy cherry and red fruit flavours, anticipate some lively mineral acidity to balance out all that ripe fruit and prepare yourself for a finish you'd shell out sixty notes for. Eight bucks off retail?

#### Coopers Creek Hawkes Bay Merlot 2002

was \$19.95 now \$12.95

Sourced from three different HB sites, this is consistently Coopers' biggest-selling red which, when you think how many cases they move of everything else, says a great deal about the appeal and approachability of this wine. It's amazing that we've nabbed some of the 2002, and even more astounding that we've discounted it. It's all about fruit; luscious layers of plums and berries, made even more gorgeous by hints of vanillin oak and a shred of spice. It's drinking perfectly right now; grab a case to ameliorate the onset of winter. Outstanding, in every way.



#### Goldwater Roseland Marlborough Chardonnay 2005

was \$19.95 now \$16.95



Great buying. The GW's have clocked up a string of seriously good vintages of this beauty, and here is yet another one. Boisterous, upfront melon and peach notes surge forth abed a creamy malo-influenced, alcohol-weighted palate that hints at butterscotch. The oak is spicy, adding texture and weight without ever taking over, making this a fully flavoured, beautifully constructed, powerful chardonnay with no shortage of class. Priced to move in volume, take the chance to nab a case or two; it'll be the best financial decision you make this tax vear.


#### Tyrrell'S old Winery SE Australian Pinot Noir 2004

Last month, the Glengarry Tasting Panel lined up over 20 Pinots, hid their pedigree from view and slugged their way through the offerings. While all regions, styles and price points were covered, this offering from the Aussie Pinot giants came up best. We tried them in different order, stood on one leg, even came in on a Sunday, cos we just couldn't believe that a \$13.95 wine could outclass all comers. It is a delicious, appealingly rounded wine with a generous fruit palate. a subtle oak touch, a seductive earthy character and plenty of legs to see the lamb off the table comfortably.

Sacred Hill's first commercial wine, the 1986 Fumé Blanc, had one very important hallmark: it came off a family block, the Dartmoor vineyard in Hawkes Bay. For, despite moving from a Sauvignon made in a garden shed to being a manythousand case producer, Sacred Hill is still very much a family-run operation. David Mason oversees the company business as he has done from the start, and it is certainly his vision, along with that of Tony Bish and his winemaking team, that has seen Sacred Hill undergo consistent growth, transformation and huge success over the past two decades.

It is a phenomenon that has expanded beyond their home turf of Hawkes Bay to encompass key holdings in Marlborough and Central Otago. But while the volume and variety produced by Sacred Hill has grown exponentially, the wines still show great individual character, and very much reflect the unique terroir in which they are produced.

Tony Bish has proven himself capable of making outstanding wines from all of the traditional varieties, having won awards for reds and whites across the Sacred Hill range. And while he humbly credits the 'excellent vineyard selection I now have to play with', anyone who can win a gold medal for all three of the Chardonnays they produce, as Tony did in 1998, is probably being a bit backward in coming forward. Indeed, the accolades and independent endorsements that Sacred Hill have racked up are remarkable. The Riflemans Chardonnay has won a gold medal every year of its release since 1995, while, just to prove the breadth of skills, Tony Bish and the team won Best Still Rosé Wine at last year's Sydney International Wine Competition.

Expansion into the South Island has seen the accolades blossom further, with the Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc gaining gold medals and/or trophies for all of its first four vintages. With scores in the high 90's in Spectator and Decanter, awards from across the globe, and so many 5-star ratings from Cuisine that they could make their own sky, the cabinet is bursting. The key thing here is that the praise, both critical and commercial, is across the whole range of Sacred Hill wines, proving that they walk their talk when they say they 'want to make high quality, great value wine, no matter what the price point.' This ubiquity of excellence is crucial to understanding the Sacred Hill philosophy: to consistently deliver wines of value, quality and character, irrespective of price.

#### Sacred Hill

Whitecliff Viognier 2005

was \$16.95 now \$12.95

The classic white grape of the northern Rhône has shown that, in the right hands and in the right vine-yards, it can flourish here, far from its renowned home of Condrieu. This is a great example, showing exactly the exotic, haunting, floral and dried apricots/fresh peach aromas one would expect from top-flight Viognier. The palate, too, delivers a weight, texture and hedonistic voluptuousness that runs way above the price tag, while the peachy/apricot flavours stay rich and true, right to the very end of the long finish. Warming and deeply seductive, it is a great expression of this heavenly white, at a price mere mortals can afford.



We've been sipping away at this every time the sun has reared its welcome head in the past month or two, which has been, we are delighted to say, quite often. For this is a delightful wine, its cool, crisp slightly pearlike flavours lending a piquancy to the autumnal mood that tells us the barbecue must soon be hibernated in the garage. Slickly smart, with razor-edged fruit, it has a spine-tingling acidity that is balanced by a fleshy, tropical richness, making it fab with food or without. The fruit is so good that the fresh acidity merely brings it back into line, making for a poised, balanced and mighty easy to drink, late summer white.



Gunn Estate's Skeetfield Chardy won gold galore at the shows last year, so the crew have followed it up with an exquisitely-crafted, small-batch wine for the black label range. So named as the fruit comes off Alan Gunn's Windburn vineyard in the hot Ohiti Valley, this is immensely concentrated and rich, yet elegantly crafted to impress without being unduly overpowering. Skilful oak handling ensures weight and depth; the great fruit from a single site means character a-plenty, with the whole a uniquely brilliant expression of Hawkes Bay chardonnay.

Cabernet Sauvignon 2003



From Coonawarra Kings, Katnook, this is a typically bold but classy **Aussie Cabernet that makes some** of the lesser Australian offerings look like ugly ducklings, to be frank. Dark plum in colour, like the plushest hotel carpet you've ever slept on, the nose is red berries and attractive leather/cedar notes. There is a gorgeous, balancing olive savouriness, and some lifted mint notes mingle engagingly with the vanilla and dark chocolate characters. Supple and vivacious, it's a mouthful but not a handful, just a 100% varietal, single region Cab from one of the country's best





# SUVAN FRANCE



It's not unusual for a grape variety to be known by a dozen or more synonyms, but it is rare that the name used on the label is the clue to the style. The Syrah variety is the most important of the Northern Rhône, where it produces dense, rich, peppery reds with a fine edge of tannin that makes them very long-lived. In Australia the same variety is called Shiraz, but in general, it is less peppery and more exuberant, with a riper fruit sweetness and a creamy oak influence.

The Syrah vine is one of the oldest, and can be traced to the Rhône Valley, well before Roman occupation. The most frequently-quoted theory regarding its origins is that it arrived in the Rhône from Persia, where there is, coincidently, a city called Shiraz. DNA fingerprinting conducted by Davis University, however, suggests that Syrah was probably derived from local varieties.

Whatever its origins, Syrah is a vigorous vine that thrives in shallow, well-drained soils. It buds and ripens late, but is a reliable cropper, has good resistance to diseases and vineyard pests (birds excluded), but needs to be managed to keep yields low. Syrah does best in sites that enjoy high temperatures, but in very hot conditions it tends to rush to over-ripeness, and produce flabby wines that lack balance. When properly managed in beneficial conditions, Syrah produces inky black, richly-flavoured, concentrated, aromatic wines with distinctive peppery aromas and flavours capable of ageing majestically for twenty years or more.

New Zealand and Rhône Syrah are grown in comparable conditions, and the wines are stylistically similar. During the month, we'll be conducting some tastings, and you'll be able put your palate to the test and see if you can distinguish one from the other. As late as the 1970's, Syrah plantings in France were restricted to the vineyards of Northern Rhône, but spurred on by that region producing two of the world's greatest wines, Hermitage and Côte-Rôtie (both straight Syrah), plantings have increased dramatically throughout southern France over the last twenty years.

In France, if Syrah is Vin-de-Pays, it can come from anywhere in the country and generally has the word Syrah attached to the label. However when it is from the Northern Rhône, the Syrah designation rarely features. The custom there, as in other parts of France, is to name wines after the village or property where the wine was made. It is one of the idiosyncratic aspects of the French Appellation Contrôlée system, the reasoning being that the French consider wines should be expressive of their terroir. Rhône appellations devoted to Syrah include famous names such as Hermitage, Crozes-Hermitage, St-Joseph, Cornas and Côte-Rôtie.

Northern Rhône Syrah consists of earthy, oaked styles that exhibit great complexity; the growing conditions resemble those to be found in Hawkes Bay, and you won't encounter the inky, eucalyptus characters common to Australia.

The Laroche family have been in the wine business in Chablis for more than 150 years, and while it remains their spiritual home, they've expanded their interests beyond Burgundy to encompass the south of France. Despite their traditional winemaking family origins, the Laroche varietals are modern and New World in style; being a French table wine, this is unencumbered by all the regulations that normally tie up French winemakers, ensuring that it's great value as well as great drinking. The exceptional ripeness and concentration of the fruit is courtesy of 2003's massive heatwave, with the rich plum and black cherry flavours supported by ground pepper and leathery nuances.



Les Jalets Crozes-Hermitage 2003

was \$32.95 now \$29.95 45381

This Syrah is from a six-hectare vineyard located at Les Jalets (old Rhône for The Pebbles), within the Crozes-Hermitage appellation and close to the northern Rhône's renowned Hermitage hill. Again from the hot 2003 vintage, it is ripeness-plus, and smells and tastes of licorice and liqueur-soaked raisins. Thick, rich and opulent, it is distinctly stylish, and deserving of respect and a good, long evening. It was fermented in stainless steel tanks and matured in oak and bottle before release. With its exuberantly fruity bouquet and nicely rounded palate, it is exceptional value.

### NEWZEALAND

Syrah is not a new variety to New Zealand; it was being grown here more than a hundred years ago, but it is only in the last decade that the grape has made its spectacular comeback. In 1996 there were 22 hectares planted; now there are more than 250, and it is increasing rapidly. The surge of plantings is largely confined to Hawkes Bay, which has excellent vineyard sites containing the right balance of soils, heat and coolness to ripen Syrah to full maturity. The wines they produce are reminiscent of the Rhône style; they have richness, power, finesse and distinctive spicy, peppery characters.

New Zealand Syrah has come a long way in a short time, as demonstrated at the 2003 Tri-Nations Wine Challenge, when Hawkes Bay wines were judged first and second in a tasting of Syrah from Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. In the 2004 Sydney International Wine Competition, Brookfields made the Aussies sit up and take notice when their 2002 Hillside Syrah won the Trophy for Best Red Table Wine. Syrah is on a roll here, and the wines we've featured are the pick of the bunch.



#### Matua Valley

Matheson Hawkes Bay Syrah 2004

was \$22.95 now \$18.95

Matua Valley have been making Syrah for a long time now, and their experience with the variety shows. Good NZ Syrah can be hard to find for under \$25, so coming in at under \$20, this stacks up as something of a bargain. Matua's Matheson Vineyard, located on the Heretaunga Plains of Hastings, enjoys free-draining, gravel-laden soils and hot summer temperatures. The conditions here are ideal for Syrah, and the vineyard is meticulously managed. The wine has a bright, youthful appearance, while on the nose, spice-accented plum and blueberry aromas flow onto the palate. Medium weighted and well balanced, it has spicy fruit flavours, a soft mouthfeel and a fine, tannin finish.

#### Villa Maria

Private Bin Hawkes Bay Syrah 2004

was \$29.95 now \$20.95

Villa Maria is New Zealand's most awarded wine company, consistently winning medals and trophies both at home and abroad. A stand-out for our Tasting Panel, this wine obviously went on to impress the judges at the Royal Easter Show Wine Awards as well, picking up a gold medal there. It was harvested from selected Hawkes Bay vineyards and traditionally fermented and matured in French oak barriques for fifteen months. It's an upfront, firmly varietal Syrah with plenty of ripe black cherry and plum fruit on the pepper-doused nose. There is a smartly spicy edge to the fleshy palate, that boasts a slick texture and a fine finish.

#### Gunn Estate

Silistria Syrah 2004

was \$<del>29.95</del> now \$24.95

Another new release from Gunn Estate's smartly crafted Black label series, this joins their top range alongside the award-winning Skeetfield Chardonnay, and is yet another sublime creation from winemaking supremo, Denis Gunn, a man who undoubtedly knows what he's doing. Considering its pedigree, at sub-\$25 this is excellent value; hand harvested, fermented in small batches and matured in French oak barriques for twelve months, it is dark and silky, with spicy fruit flavours and delicate hints of liquorice.



#### Te Mata Bullnose

Hawkes Bay Syrah 2004

was \$46.95 now \$39.95

Te Mata is a New Zealand icon, and their Bullnose is one of our iconic wines; given the sheer volume of new stuff pouring onto the market, over time you can forget how good this Syrah is, but a revisit has quickly established why it earned its status in the first place; in the blind tasting conducted by Glengarry's Tasting Panel, this came in as the Number 1 Wine. Brimming with blackberry, cherry and plum aromas enhanced by a peppery edge and vanillin oak, the ripe, smooth, elegantly-structured palate is awash with rich fruit and nicely integrated spicy oak flavours that persist through to the finish. If Te Mata deigned to enter shows (they don't), this would be a contender for gold. No contest.



Deerstalkers Hawkes Bay Syrah 2004

was \$59.95 now \$54.95

Sacred Hill's Tony Bish has crafted a Syrah to rival some of the best that the northern Rhône has to offer, and it is the deserved recipient of a gold medal at the Royal Easter Show Wine Awards. The hand-harvested grapes were traditionally fermented, hand-plunged, given extended maceration, put through malolactic fermentation and matured in French oak barriques for 18 months. That effort has paid off in a complex, seductive wine that's inky black and concentrated. The palate displays great intensity, a seamless cascade of fruit, chocolate, black pepper and smoky oak, wound around a warm coat and held in check by firm tannins. As a member of Sacred Hill's Premium Range, the Deerstalkers will only be made in exceptional years.





#### Kilikanoon

How can you go past a winery that proudly proclaims one of its business partners to be the first cellist in the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, and while at it, appoints the violinist/conductor of the orchestra to the board as well, for good measure? Nope, there's nothing conventional about Kilikanoon's winemaker, Kevin Mitchell, and what's also remarkable about Kevin is how quickly he's led this Clare Valley juggernaut to the top of the charts.

Mitchell has been a viticulturist in the Clare for three decades, and has worked at some of Australia's top wineries (d'Arenberg, BRL Hardy, Orlando), but it is at the old Kilikanoon restaurant and property, which he took over in 1997, that he has made his mark. The main blocks had been planted 25 years prior, so while the winery was not a commercial success, it did have the seeds of success, these being old vines in great soil. Only a maverick like Mitchell could see through the run-down property to the potential that lay beneath the dirt. The grapes are almost all dry-grown and are, without exception, picked by hand. That soil is Terra Rossa over limestone, known for its drainage and its excellent suitability for the production of concentrated, long-lived wines, particularly those constructed from the red varieties.

Those red wines, and the stylish whites Kevin produces from key Clare Valley sites, have impressed all the way to the top, and none seem more wowed than US wine guru Robert Parker. And, for a man who can be miserly with his praise, Parker is positively effusive when it comes to Kilikanoon.

'This is one of the most brilliantly run wineries in Australia... the quality of the entire portfolio is impressive thanks to the enviable talents of winemaker Kevin Mitchell,' enthused Parker in his Wine Advocate.

Parkerine personal big-ups aside, the success of Kilikanoon lies in the glass, and the trophies, reviews, and endorsements in the last decade have been phenomenal, both on his home soil and around the world. However, what is endearing about his wine and his approach, is that while Kevin embraces the independent praise for his wines, he still considers that 'the thrill of seeing single vineyards evolve into wines' is one of the most rewarding parts of his job, and will always be so.

But with the rave reviews, the limited production and the sheer popularity amongst wine enthusiasts for Kilikanoon's product, we wonder how long that will last.

#### Kilikanoon

Killerman's Run Shiraz 2004

was \$23.95 now \$18.95

Even at a sub-\$20 price point, the concentration, intensity and sheer denseness of the fruit in this wine is remarkable. Made from small batches, all vinified separately and then imprisoned for a lag of 24 long months in French and American oak, this is one of the most outstanding, value-for-money reds we've seen in a good long while. Glaringly bright in the glass, the Killerman's Run is a brash, upfront wine with elevated plum fruit characters spread thickly over coffee and chocolate. The older oak is present and correct, but not dominant, the palate is generous, the tannins are gentle, while the alcohol content ensures weight and warmth in good measure.



A 100% Grenache can be a difficult feat to pull off; the wines, particularly from the Barossa, come off as almost too sweet, the fruit sickly and/or baked. Not so here. For this wine, the fruit comes off old (40 to 60-year-old), dry-grown vines, so you know it's going to be well concentrated, if nothing else. But it's much more than that, redolent of cherries and chocolate with hints of leather, centred round an almost dusty, spicy oak frame. It is bone dry, but that sweet Grenache fruit is richly uplifting, something that's reaffirmed by the warm and alcoholic (15%) palate and the flavour persistence. Sturdy and sumptuous.

#### Kilikanoon

Block's Road Cabernet Sauvignon 2003

was \$31.95 now \$25.95

#### 92/100, Robert Parker

'It would be difficult to find a Californian Cabernet for under US\$50 that competes with this beauty' says Robert Parker. Dry-grown, handpicked, concentrated fruit such as this doesn't need a heavy oak influence, so Mitchell ages it for 24 months (gulp), but in large oak hogsheads as opposed to the usual barriques. Again, it's unfined and unfiltered, so you get all the goodies with nothing stripped out. It gushes violets, lashes you with licorice and sends little flocks of small berries across your palate in ever-seductive salvoes. The drying and long finish are exceptional; and if you're patient, it'll drink well until 2018. Uh-huh.



#### Kilikanoon

Covenant Shiraz 2002

was \$49.95 now \$42.95



'Kilikanoon's reds are all impressive, rich, concentrated offerings displaying surprising balance as well as precision.' So says Robert Parker, who went on to award this a dizzying 95 points. Low-yielding, hand tended, 30 to 40-year-old vines again provide immense concentration, with a density that coats your palate in a most exquisite fashion. The 14% alcohol is present in the warm and rich tones of the mid-palate, whose flavours cover the spectrum from blackberry, spice and new leather characters through to the traditional, varietal white pepper. Inky purple in colour, intense and generous, the finish (that lasts for over a minute) indicates you are in the presence of greatness.

Ruby red, full of fruit and seductively soft, it's a winner on all fronts, and with our own pencil-sharpening bringing it down to a price that in French or English spells 'ludicrous', I say, make hay, people.

Long Flat
Chardonnay 2004

A regular visitor to our Fearless Buys Page is the Long Flat brand, for one simple reason: it delivers wines of value, flavour and quality, without exception. Look at the evidence, counsellor. The Long Flat Vineyards have been producing commercial wine since 1966, and they do it in huge volume; hence the tiny price tag. They do it year in, year out, never mind the weather. And, if you need final proof, they sell this wine by the vat load. Full of fruit, flavour, and, er, fruit flavour, there's a sliver of oak for complexity and a palate you could surf to town on. It's just good, clean fun, people. Apply liberally.

The Talented Taltarni Team have been making elegant, flavoursome sparklies from premium Victoria and Tasman sites since Winston was in short (pinstriped, no doubt) pants. Produced using strict Champagne methods, aged accordingly and artfully blended, this is a generous, refined wine with plenty of cut and thrust and no shortage of glittering charm. If you don't buy a case, you may have jumped on the crazy bus into town by mistake.

These are strange days, indeed in Beersville, Australia. 'Aussies worry about their weight', scream the headlines. So, do they go to the gym? Nah! Reduce their prolific beer intake? Nah! Lighten the beer itself. Genius! Carlton's Pure Blonde is a low carb, full-strength (4.6% ABV) brewski, and as unlike the lite-style US beers as you can get. Containing only 0.9 grams of carbs, as opposed to normal beer, which is 3g/100ml, it is fully flavoured, clean and crisp with plenty of meat, and feels just divine as it foams on the corners of your walrus, Chopper Reid moustache. Expect it in a gym-drinks vending machine sometime soon.








#### Bruichladdich

An insistent whisper of Islay lies behind this stylish and subtle single malt. Glengarry offers three expressions of this fine drop, but I have nosed only the 10-year-old at 46% a/v. With its light peatiness and its clean, crisp and dry flavour, it differs from the other malts from Islay, due to the tall, long-necked stills that Bruichladdich use. The mild peat reak is explained by the water, which comes from an inland source and is therefore not so influenced by the sea and peat of the landscape. This makes the 10-year-old an excellent aperitif, a charming pre-dinner drink that does not flood the senses as many Islay malts can do. Look for the flowery and salty nose, with the taste hanging in the mouth for quite a long time. As with most malts at this alcohol level, I recommend a dash of water or even a small block of ice so, as it melts, the nose and flavour open up like a blossom.

#### Montes

Reserve Oak Aged Merlot 2004

A well-crafted young Merlot that has all the elements to allow it to mature gracefully over the next two to three years. A 15 percent portion of Cabernet Sauvignon has added depth and structure. The bouquet is well integrated, with the berry fruit complemented by vanillin oak. Polished, round and deftly balanced to let the spicy fruit flavours flow effortlessly over the palate.



Montes Reserve Oak Aged Malbec 2004

A full-bodied wine with an exotic bouquet displaying blackberry, plum, chocolate and understated toasty oak characters. The palate is powerfully built but elegantly structured, with primary, spiceedged plum flavours enhanced by well integrated, subtle vanillin oak. There are hints of chocolate in the mid palate that add complexity. Well balanced and smoothly textured. it has a beautifully long, flavoursome aftertaste.

#### Montes

Reserve Oak Aged Cabernet Sauvignon 2004

This 85% Cabernet, 15% Merlot was selectively harvested from the Montes' Colchagua Valley Estates. It is characterized by an impressive concentration of currant, cherry and cassis aromas and flavours. The Merlot component fills the midpalate nicely, and 6 months' ageing in American oak has provided a complementary hint of unobtrusive oak. Beautifully structured, with a velvety mouthfeel and fine, tannin

# a taste of France

Louis Sipp

Alsace Pinot Gris 2003

was \$30.95 now \$24.95

Domaine Louis Sipp was one of the absolutely standout producers for us during a recent trip to Alsace. The Domaine enjoys a high reputation there, and its production facilities in Ribeauville are among the most modern in the region. Sipp's reputation has been built on the consistently high quality of its wines, all based on the region's 'noble' varieties. This delicious wine was cool fermented to retain fruit definition, and displays lovely, honeyed, spicy, nutty aromas that lead on to the palate. It is wonderfully balanced, with stonefruit flavours and lively citrus nuances that accelerate on the finish. If Pinot Gris is your thing, try this.



Sauternes 2nd Growth 2002 375mL

was \$43.95 now \$32.95

Chateau Filhot was declared a Second Growth in the 1855 Official Classifications of Bordeaux. The property, established in the 17th century, has about sixty hectares under vines, and Robert Parker, in his book on Bordeaux, declared it; 'one of the most magnificent estates in the entire Sauterne region'. This offering from Filhot was made entirely from botrytized grapes fermented in tank and briefly matured in new and seasoned oak. It is a pale golden wine, with a fragrant nose displaying wild flowers, apricot, honey, and citrus aromas that splash onto the palate. The luscious fruit tones are enhanced by a silky texture and balanced by a lively, citrus finish.

Georges Duboeuf New Generation Merlot 2003

was \$17.95 now \$15.95

A full-bodied wine with well-defined plum flavours. Graceful, soft and playful, but not without power or character, it is most definitely a new breed from the King of France. Silky smooth and supple, it finishes on a longish, mellow note.

Chateau du Pin
Bordeaux Merlot Cabernet 2003

was \$17.95 now \$15.95

This unpretentious, classically-styled Bordeaux is great value. It comes from a small family estate in the heart of Bordeaux, and is a Merlot-dominated blend (75%), supported by Cabernet and traditionally fermented and matured in oak. The nose has classic cassis, black-currant and cedary nuances that roll onto the palate. Well weighted, with a core of firm tannins to give the fruit substance and length.

Paul Jaboulet

Parallèle 45 Côtes du Rhône 2003

was \$22.95 now \$17.95

A Syrah-Grenache, skilfully blended to produce a wine that delivers much more than one would expect at the price. Matured in oak and bottle, it has a young appearance with dashes of purple around the rim. The bouquet is intense and complex, with cherry and peppery aromas supported by spicy oak. It is structured around a core of supple tannins that complement the ripe berry flavours lingering at the finish.

## a taste of Pasqua V Valpolicella Classico 2004

5 now \$12.95

This wine represents remarkable value. It is from the Classico zone in the hilly vinevards centred on Grezzana, just north of Verona. The wine was produced from the DOC's famous trio of native grapes Corvina (70%), Rondinella (20%), and Corvinone (10%). It is a ruby-red wine with a lively, fragrant bouquet exhibiting cherry and plum aromas and flavours. Medium bodied, it is nicely rounded and finishes on a tasty note.

> Pasqua Terre del Sole 1-5 LITRE Sangiovese 2004

was \$19.95 now \$16.95 66070

Produced from grapes grown in the province of Trapani, on the western tip of Sicily, this is exceptional value. Presented in a magnum, you are actually getting two bottles for an equivalent price of \$8.47 a bottle. Intensely coloured, it has well-defined violet and cherry on the nose, and the palete is characterised by a supple texture that enhances the ripe fruit flavours lingering on at the finish.

A fruit-driven, stylish Merlot grown in the north-west Italian region of Veneto. The final blend, after malolactic fermentation, was matured in a combination 50/50 oak and stainless steel, and further aged for a minimum period of three months. It is a healthy ruby colour, with lovely cherry and plum aromas and a hint of vanillin oak. Nicely balanced and weighted, it is well structured and integrated, with a smooth texture and a firmish finish.

> Scrimaglio No Cork Barbera d'Asti 2002

was \$32.95 now \$25.95 e8716

A Silver Medal-winner in London, this wine is packaged under a crown seal, the Italian take on the screw cap. Produced from 100% Barbera from the Nizza Monferrato district of Piedmont. it is a wine of considerable class. The exuberant bouquet is packed with blackcurrant fruit aromas and spicy nutmeg nuances. The concentrated palate is positively fruit-driven, with the ripe flavours enhanced by a velvety smoothness.

#### Pronounced Ver-dell-oh

Verdelho is a Portuguese white grape variety most famously responsible for a style of Madeira, and for making white port. Ever keen to try something new, and consistently strong in the belief that they can turn just about anything into drinkable table wine, the Australians got hold of this high acid, high alcohol variety and started to see what it could do. And before we accuse our country cousins of trying to satisfy marketers rather than drinkers, it is worth noting that Verdelho was first brought to Australia in 1820.

Finding its feet in the hotter climes of Western Australia and the Hunter, Australia started to turn out some pretty smart wines. From lemony, vibrant and fullbodied through to lush, tropical expressions of this grape, the overall impression is that whatever the style, the wines are good, uncomplicated alternatives to Chardonnay and Sauvignon. In our climate of barrel-fermented this and malo'd that, a wine that smells and tastes of grapes is mighty welcome. And being a less mainstream variety, Verdehlo represents extraordinarily good value.

While Australia is the most recognised home of the Big V after the Isle of Madeira and Oporto itself, we are delighted to report that some of our more maverick winemakers are having a wee play with this beast, and achieving some remarkable results. Meteorologically speaking, Madeira we ain't, but Hawkes Bay can get hot enough to ripen the strange, elliptical little Verdehlo grapes, as Gordon Russell from Esk Valley has shown for a couple of vintages now. As far as pairing up the kai, lighter meats like chicken and pork go well with the fresher styles, while Asian flavours just explode with delight when matched with the richer, more alcoholic and hence more unctuous Verdehlo wines.

Sure, with New Zealand's total plantings of Verdehlo expected to rocket from five hectares to seven by 2007, Sauvignon Blanc volumes need not feel threatened. However, as the drinking public open their minds, mouths and wallets to these new varieties, and as more winemakers experiment, tweak and get right these varietals from far-flung places, expect to see more than just the Esk wines on our shelves. And until then, try some of the Aussie ones as well: they make for a great and positive change in your drinking experience.

Esk Valley Hawkes Bay Verdelho **2005** 

was \$26.95 now \$19.95

The grapes for this wine were harvested from Esk Valley's Omahu Gravels Vineyard, which enjoys freedraining soils of low fertility. The 2005 vintage proved ideal for this early-ripening variety. It was hot and dry, and delivered an excellent yield of concentrated, well-balanced grapes. They were harvested in two separate picks; the first fermented in stainless steel tanks on selected yeasts, the second barrel fermented using indigenous yeasts. Following fermentation, the batches were blended, and bottled early under screw cap to retain vibrancy. A pale, greenish-gold wine, it has a perfumed nose exhibiting lively, lime-accented tropical fruit aromas and a hint of oak. The fruit flavours are beautifully balanced by a smack of citrus freshness.




