> They don't make a lot of noise at Nga Waka, just quietly going about their business producing excellent wines, wines that have consistently improved from their already fine beginnings well over a decade ago. 2006 was one of those 'not a lot of it, but what there is, is great' vintages, and this release underscores that. A full-flavoured, full-bodied beauty, its passionfruit and gooseberries leap about the palate with barely contained joy and much crisp persistence. Stunning at any price, earth-moving at this one.

BrookfælsBergman Baræl Færented Chardony2006

PARTY PRAINLES

Excitingly ripe and competitively priced, named for the Bergman roses adjacent to the winery at Meanee. Fermented in French and American oak, subjected to a partial malolactic ferment, aged on lees - this wine sees all the treatment most wineries would reserve for their reserve wines. Yet Brookfields release it vintage after vintage at an enticingly affordable price. Rich and creamy, it works brilliantly with a host of foods, while being able to handle the jandal quite superbly on its own.

Lovingly nurtured and carefully selected fruit from key sites in Marlborough was fleshed out by some deliciously lush Gimblett Gravels grapes to ensure this is a fruitburst of juicy goodness, all luscious plums and cherries and the like. Doing time in French barrels has ensured integration of fruit parcels and flavours and a sneaky seasoning of spicy oak. Flakes of chocolate and sprinkles of cinnamon/nutmeg complete the picture: it's a great mouthful at the end of the day. Every day, in fact.

Monteslassic Series Malbec2006

Like so many great red grapes, Malbec had its origins in France, and while the variety is still popular in the southwest and used as a blender in Bordeaux. it is the Argentines and Chileans who now produce the world's greatest expressions. This killer offering, from one of Chile's consistently great producers, is one of them. There's a silkiness not dissimilar to merlot, and a slight Cabernet spice and grip, but mostly its 100% dark, fruitily intense Malbec, straight up and delightfully drinkable.

Ti Point



Not so very long ago, the New Zealand wine industry was almost completely dominated by men. There were a number of women involved, but by and large they did not, with the odd notable exception, play a significant role. Today the wine industry can boast that whatever barriers existed have been well and truly demolished. There is probably no better example of the advances that have been made than Ti Point.

This Matakana vineyard is owned and nurtured by three generations of the Haslam family; matriarch Ilene, her daughter Jan and grand-daughter Tracy. The Family has owned the tiny, 3.5-hectare vineyard perched on the north-facing peninsular above Omaha Bay for seventeen years. It is very much an all-hands-to-the-pumps operation; the land was initially hand-cleared of scrub by the three women, with some help from friends and relatives.

The planting of Bordeaux varieties, Merlot, Malbec and Cabernet Franc, was carried out progressively from 1993, and the vineyard is now well established. Everything on the scrupulously managed property is done by hand; pruning, weeding, canopy management and harvesting. The site enjoys a benevolent meso-climate, with steady, gentle sea breezes moderating the higher temperatures of summer.

The driving force at Ti Point is Tracy; she grew up in the Matakana area, went to the local high school and, after the traditional Kiwi OE, enrolled at Hawkes Bay's Eastern Institute of Technology, where she graduated with a Diploma in Wine Science. To gain winemaking experience, Tracy set off overseas and worked several vintages in different countries, including Italy, Switzerland, California, and at the famous Château Figeac in Bordeaux. On her return to New Zealand, she became winemaker at Hawkes Bay wineries Lombardi and Black Barn.

The first Ti Point Wines were released in the new millennium and were an immediate success. There is no room at Ti Point for a winery, so Tracy makes the wines at a Hawkes Bay facility. She aims to create wines that are supple, individual and food-friendly. To achieve this, she employs a 'minimal handling' regime that allows the wines to express their individual terroirs, using fruit that embodies the individuality of the variety. The flagship reds are made entirely from Ti Point-grown fruit, but the company's other wines, notably Chardonnay and Viognier, are produced from Hawkes Bay vineyards, and the Sauvignon Blanc from Marlborough-grown fruit, all hand-crafted with great care, attention to detail and a passion for quality.

Ti Point's latest Marlborough Sauvignon release owes much to the outstanding quality of the 2007 vintage. As always, Tracy's meticulous winemaking was aimed to emphasise and retain the fresh, zesty characters that have made Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc a world favourite. It is a pale yellow with flashes of green around the rim. The bouquet opens on a ripe, spicy note underscored by tropical fruit, hints of herb and mineral, while the palate is sharply focused, the upfront fruit flavours enhanced by a slick texture and balanced by smart, limey finish.

One sip of this, and it's easy to comprehend why Chardonnay is the world's favourite white wine. It is a subtly styled Hawkes Bay creation revealing a lovely array of nuances with every sip. Green-gold in colour, it offers up a fragrant bouquet of lime-edged peach aromas and the merest whisper of oak. It's a fresh, graceful mouthful, inlaid with stonefruit flavours bound by a light, creamy texture and balanced by a flourish of citrus. Not only is this wine great value, but it's an excellent accompaniment to food as well.

TiPont Vigner2007

BUY A CASE OF 12 FOR \$15.90 A BOTTLE Viognier is an ancient variety believed to have been introduced

into the Rhône Valley by the Romans. A relative newcomer to New Zealand, it has a reputation for being difficult to grow, and yields can be unreliable; but the wines it produces, like this beauty from Ti Point, are very distinctive. This is a seductive wine, with lifted aromas of blossom, spice and honeyed apricot. The palate has a lovely spicy edge, a touch of oak and a wonderfully textural mouthfeel.

TiPont TWO Merlot Cabreet2006

A healthy, mahogany-coloured wine still showing youthful cerise highlights. The scented bouquet has an abundance of ripe berry, plum and coffee aromas that are well integrated with smoky oak nuances. There is a fine, immediately impressive density of berry and plum-toned flavours that spread endlessly over the palate, embellished by an unobtrusive oak influence that adds greater dimension, supported by a svelte texture extending the flavours even further. Excellent food wine and superb value.

G TiPont ONE Merlot2005



The 2005 Matakana vintage was one of best on record; fruit set was excellent and the long hot summer meant the grapes were harvested late in the season to deliver a well ripened, concentrated crop. The hand-harvested bunches were fermented (80% as whole berries) hand plunged, basket pressed and matured in new oak barriques. This is a stellar red, possessing ripe cherry, blackberry, chocolate and spicy oak aromas. The palate has a myriad of flavours coursing through, and boasts a slinky feel and a lingering, flavourful finish.

A recent addition to the Reserve range for Sacred Hill, this is 100% Marlborough fruit from an excellent vintage. An Aussie wine critic once described Pinot Gris as 'white paint on a white canvas': I suggest someone send him a bottle of this immediately to change his mind. Intensely perfumed and fully flavoured, the overriding aromatic impressions are of fruit blossom and fragrant florals, while the palate continues the apricot theme and seamlessly adds a host of other rich fruit nuances for good measure.

Wid South Marlboroughiret Grais

Winemaker Christie Brown has huge renown for her whites, so no surprises that this adds another goodie to the Christie canon. A spicy varietal lift is followed by warming and enticing baked apple characters, while the palate shows the subtle pear characters for which Pinot Gris is well-known. Said palate is luscious and unctuous, the richness shot through with a balancing minerality that is hallmark Marlborough. Grab some while you can: this won't sit around for long, especially at this price.

G Montesimitedesection Cabernet Sauvon Caménère2006



'The new power base for Carménère is Chile,' says English critic Jancis Robinson, hinting at its previous prevalence and eminence in Bordeaux. With the richness and charm of merlot, it's a perfect sparring partner for Cabernet. A single estate offering, this is a characterful, stronglyflavoured drop; 'soft and friendly' as they put it, but not lacking in structure and weight. We always seem to be running out of this; having landed an entire Chilean container, we promise satiation for ever more.

Nga Waka MartinborougEhardony2006



With yields down but quality high for the '06 vintage, there was more than a stir of excitement when the first pallet of this hit the Glengarry dock. The first luscious mouthful is indeed deeply rewarding. A river of rich stonefruit runs over your tongue, while a mealy butterscotch character adds intrigue and complexity, the whole being a wine of complexity and weight destined to enhance even your most furtive culinary experiences. Big ups to the pencil sharpeners for the excellent price, too.

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It was the charming and low key gangsta rappers Public Enemy who said, 'Don't Believe the Hype', a phrase that you could be tempted to attach to all the fussing that's going on about New Zealand Pinot Noir. Golly, we have international conferences on the great grape happening regularly, we have people drawing pearl-handed pistols at dawn over whether Martinborough make better Pinot than those Central Otago upstarts and, most obviously, we have an explosion of plantings and producers that is as mind-blowing as it is exciting.

Because exciting it is, and hype it is not. Around the world there is a consensus emerging amongst wine writers, critics and Burgundy enthusiasts that, outside of France, the world's best Pinot Noir comes from inside New Zealand (damn but it's great to beat the Aussies at something). Likely, though, you know this already. There wouldn't be a profusion of producers if no one was drinking their product.

It has been a rapid rise to success for Pinot, relatively speaking. In little more than a decade we've gone from diluted raspberry cordial styles and/ or over-extracted 'is this Pinot or Merlot?' styles to a vast range of Pinot expressions and consistently good wines, vintage to vintage.

Check out the following wines, look at the choice and feel the love. Wines from Martinborough, where it all started, from Nelson, from Central Otago, from Marlborough. But, you ask correctly, can every Pinot produced be that good? Can all that land that's been planted recently be perfect Pinot producing pasture? No, and no.

Which is why we've made an informed decision and selected what we consider to be the plum Pinots. Unfortunately there are some very average wines out there that qualify as little more than dry red, so characterless are they. And often, sadly, their price points don't reflect this. So we've tried to communicate value: a \$65 wine can actually be great buying, while one for a tenner might, technically, be thievery. Oh, we've tasted our way through a couple of hundred wines, don't worry, and Pinot, being subjective, means we could have been there all day; but a loosely formed consensus says the wines featured here represent some great drinking, good buying and show the dizzying array of characteristics emerging as our winemakers get a handle on this Holy Grail of red grapes.

Nodding respectfully to our French friends, we have also pulled out some great Burgundies so that, if you're a bit new to it all, you can get an understanding of how Pinot is expressed in the land where it all began. With both 2005 in France and 2006 in New Zealand being outstanding Pinot Noir vintages, one thing is for sure, you will not be disappointed.

CENTRAL OTAGO

Waipara Hl southern Ors Selecon Centralt@goPinot N2006

Medium bodied and soft, full and generous, with varietal black cherries and plums, while hints of forest floor keep it interesting. It's an authentic style of Pinot - there's no trickery or tom-foolery here, just 'essence of Pinot Noir' framed in some well managed oak tannins. It has a presence which is the result of pure, clean fruit, rather than of alcohol sweetness. One of the consistently finest wines from this wonderful region.



The Small Parcel range delivers wines that absolutely reflect their site's individual characteristics. The fruit for this comes off the Clearvue vineyard in Bendigo, the gold-mining town of Central Otago. The glass-staining colour alone announces something special, while the intensity of myriad aromas of dark fruits, spice and game may mean you'll need to sit down and think for a bit. At over 14% it's a big beastie, but it's also stunningly classy, beautifully structured and destined for great things should you cellar it.

Montan&abriesGul Centralt@goPinot N2006

While Gabriel's Gully was the beginning of the Gold Rush down Central way, Montana have wrested a different kind of precious gem from this historical soil. And it's the soil that counts; it's not called the Terroir Series for nothing. The nose is laden with damp violets, and that herbal hillside character that seems distinctly Otago. There's spice as well, with layers of rich chocolate and cherries delivered like plush velvet within the oak structural support system.



Matua have been producing Pinot since back when Russell Crowe was known as Russ Le Rog, and there's no question that one of the keys to making a superb expression is experience. You simply have to do the vintages to see how different weather patterns, soil types and aspects effect the ripening and final flavours in the fruit itself. Medium bodied with soft tannins, this is most approachable and convivial company.



Because they have planted on alluvial terraces, the Akarua vineyards get no frost and consistent sun, a critical key in getting ripeness and complex flavours in the fruit. A cracking wine from a phenomenal vintage, the 2006 shows that Akarua are an unstoppable force. Carefully managed from vineyard to winery, this seems to have an extra dimension of character compared to most, a wild herb meets dark cherry meets warm earth that almost feels like an afternoon on the sunny slopes in Central. One of the country's best.



The carmine colour flashes like a disco ball in a plush London club before you're carried off on a high with aromas of violets, brambles and blindingly bright fruit. There is a consistent flow of wondrous flavours, a firm acid and tannin presence and one of those 'are we there yet' finishes. The flavours are dense black cherry with a lovely savouriness to boot, the palate a velvet beauty that'll leave you gasping. A rock star that merits your close attention.



With the winemaker being Grant Taylor, you're expecting greatness before you've even got the cap off. Grant has amassed some 40 vintages around the world but it is this, his little pocket of Pinot paradise, that keeps his attention (and ours) these days. This is a dense, concentrated mouthful, an artfully constructed wine with a succulent, sexy mouthfeel and real power in the fruit. A total star, worth every cent and more. Get acquainted.



Belmonte are a fully sustainable and growing winery who, through fortuitous family connections, are able to use the highly-skilled John Forrest to make their wines. If anyone knows his terroir it is John, a Marlborough man for many a moon, and with this wine he has coaxed, from a more difficult vintage than the 2006, a wine with much charm and appeal. It's a smooth, seamless offering with lifted strawberry/raspberry/red fruit characters, some warming alcohol through the mid-palate, and a sweet fruit finish.



Lake Chalice have spread their wings enormously since they began. Growth hasn't meant sloth, though, and control freaks that they thankfully are, all the fruit for this comes off their own vineyards. A bright, punchy and appealing wine, with charming fruit sweetness and intensity of flavour. Cherries and currants, mostly, though you may hear a squeak of raspberry as you give it an engaging swirl about your palate. Some oak, some spice, all very nice.



Pegasus' 2nd-tier label is still first rate, and this Marlborough Pinot has much to recommend it. With the heat accumulating rather than blasting forth, the fruit develops peak physiological ripeness while maintaining some great acid. Meaning? The jam-packed flavours don't blow out on you, so to speak. This shows a great integration of fruit and savoury notes, with dark cherries and plums further enhanced by gamey, truffly characters. There's a hint of Mocha there, too, on the very long finish. Much going on for minimal outlay.



A single vineyard wine from one of the most consistent winemakers in the Marlby 'hood. A serious, brooding and intense style, with its hand-picked and sorted fruit spending 18 months in French oak, resulting in a powerful, masculine wine that shows huge concentration and much swaggering opulence. Layers of cherry-chocolate richness spread themselves over the slightly spicy, toasty oak while the firm and integrated tannins frame up the extended finish with finesse. You will be wowed.



Winemaker Matt Thomson and owner Neal Ibbotson have taken the Burgundian approach to detail into their hearts, and vineyards, having individually rated each Saint Clair site on its terroir. Hence individual Block releases such as this magnificent example of Marlborough Pinot. Overflowing with dark cherries and darker plums, it has sexy spices and a firm oak hand. There's a surety to the whole thing, a confident yet elegant expression that see-saws seamlessly between sweet and savoury.





Made by the legendary Neill Culley, this show-stopper reminds you that Marlborough can produce wines with as much concentration and finesse as any of the other Pinot-dedicated regions. Jammy and ripe, it shows flashes of garnet in the glass, while the bouquet is all scented violets and intense red cherries. Sexily elegant yet weighty, with a league of deep, succulent flavour, it is generous, opulent, silky-smooth and dangerously seductive. Class.

MARTINBOROUGH



Nga WakaThreePaddles Martinboroughinot No21006 was\$23.6 now \$19.90

When Nga Waka was still a toddler, winemaker Roger Parkinson concentrated on making white varietals of profound class and finesse. But when you own some of the best land in Martinborough, well, it'd be churlish not to make Pinot, surely. So now he makes two and this, little brother of the 'standard' Nga Waka, is an exuberant, fleshy offering. Soft, round and ripe, it paddles a gentle stream of cherries and red fruits, with the occasional swish of spice to keep it intriguing. Neat wine; great price.



After the difficulties of the 2005 vintage, 2006 in Martinborough turned out to be a sparkler and perfect for Pinot. This here is a second label, which shows how far NZ Pinot has come in such a short space of time. She's is a delight; a sincere, succulent style, red-fruited, polished and well integrated, with a touch of savouriness that augments the fruit and provides for notes of intrigue on the classy coda. Stonking value, too.



Nasty southerly weather at very much the wrong time meant Martinborough had a bit of a shocker in 2005. Don't panic, the wines are fabulous; there was just very little fruit to make them from. This has that poached-fruit-in-a-pie nose, blackberries and plums warming and spreading their seductive aromas, and there's a brambly note that adds to the pastoral idyll idea. Plunge on in and add savoury meats to a list which unfolds further with each mouthful.



From sunny Nelson which, when they get those long, lazy summers, can really get developed, complex characters in the fruit without falling prey to over-ripeness. As always with Pinot, it's a balancing act, and Te Mania acquit themselves with aplomb. And a plum or two, in this fruit-first style. Oozing blackberries, plums and dark cherries, it carries a whiff of spice and a gamey, leathery angle that ensures food matching success with lamb, pork or rabbit.



This wine is extraordinary value, with the depth, concentration and finesse that you'd expect to pay over fifty notes for. Seductively complex, with its cherries and plums bobbing in a sumptuous pool of mocha and cream, this has an underlying tease of earthy/forest floor notes that add much to an already remarkable wine. Subtle oak, starbright fruit, stupendous price.

BURGUNID LabouréRodolection Bourgogne Rougeinot No21005 was\$28 now \$25 42230 BUY A CASE OF 12 FOR ONLY \$24.00 A BOTTLE

'Most reliable of the Burgundy negociants, with the most competitive prices,' said Oz Clarke, while Wine Spectator gushed, 'No negociant has pursued a more original vision than Laboure Roi.' The wines are focused, authentic and fiercely reflective of their terroir. This is chock full of cherries and softly tannic, with an appealing oak toastiness that hints more at the New World than the old.



Chantal Tortochot has revived and reinvented the family estate since taking over from her father Gabriel towards the end of the '90s. The oldest vines date back nigh on a century, and its reputation in Gevrey Chambertin is immense. The wines are very fruit-driven and much more approachable than some of the more unforgiving Domaine expressions. With its hint of violets and feminine edge, this is a pretty wine, brilliantly executed and charmingly priced.

Made in honour of Nic's pops, and in a style that the veteran would have no doubt approved of. Concentrated, elegant Pinot, this shows beautiful depth and length, with the 40-plus-year-old vines also contributing concentration and an intensity of cherry/dark fruit flavours. Precise and focused, it offers up plenty of primary fruits touched with scintillating spice, followed by a second layer of truffle and earthy notes all in a seamless, sensuous whole. An exciting, stylish and very interesting wine.



The area known as the Côtes de Nuits contains some of the greatest red wine names in the world: Vougeot, Chambolle-Musigny, Gevrey-Chambertin, and yet it is really a wee sliver of land with its own unique characteristics. This is a bright and lively reflection of the place, darkly coloured and wonderfully expressive, with pure, varietal and very French Pinot flavours driving the palate from end to end. There is prominent, not dominant, oak and a supple freshness that is a joy.



The fruit harvested and harnessed to make this most excellent and elegant Pinot Noir comes from villages in the Cote du Beaune, and it carries more than an echo of Volnay, really, with its elegance and seductive fruitiness. There is a hint of Pommard-like robustness here too, though it's more a tannic confidence than a blustery arrogance. Ultimately this is a seductive, sensuous wine that will win you over with charm rather than disarm you with power.



Sourced from a tiny (0.7ha) site that has itself been divided into two plots, which is a charming reminder of how seriously the Burgundy Domaines take the notion of terroir. This is consistently fabulous, and a great wine for those gingerly dipping their toes into the sacred Burgundian waters. It's made deliberately in an older style, with a robust tannic structure and an earthy rusticity that many claim is Burgundy's defining characteristic. Loads of fruit too, though, and no shortage of class.

The fruity bouquet has aromas of pear and apple, and hints of mineral and cream, while the palate is elegantly structured, richly flavoured and enhanced by buttery nuances, traces of mineral and nuttiness, all balanced by a fresh, lingering finish.

Beyond the ancient city of Verona lies the valley of Valpantena, which in Greek means 'Valley of Gods,' but according to the Veronese means 'Valley of wines.' By any description, the vineyards of the Valpantena have historically been the source of some of the best examples of Valpolicella. This wine was made from native varieties and cool fermented in stainless steel tanks to retain fresh fruit flavours. It is a healthy, ruby wine with forward cherry and plum aromas. The palate has a juicy, fruity character and finishes on a bright, rounded note.

Like Zinfandel, Primitivo produces a wide range of styles and is widely used in blends, but in the hot Apulian climate it produces big burly reds. This is a deep-coloured wine with concentrated cherry, clove and blackberry aromas. The rich palate has deep seated spicy-plum flavours, enhanced by a slick texture and a long aftertaste.

With its alluring bouquet of plum, violet and understated oak, the palate is nicely focused and balanced; the ripe plum and berry flavours are deftly spread, and exhibit a hint of earthiness at the finish.

This wine has an exuberantly fresh character, with a morello cherry twist complementing the dominant, ripe plum flavours. Well rounded, superb value.

Just when the Pinot Gris mutation of Pinot Noir occurred is a matter for speculation, but the variety has the ability to adapt to a wide crosssection of soils and micro-climates. In Europe, it is most widely-grown in Germany as Rülander, in Alsace as Tokay, and in Italy as Pinot Grigio. Stylistically, the wines could not be more different. This particular example, grown in the Valadige DOC, is a pale golden colour with a mineral and herb-edged, apple-like bouquet. The palate is fresh and lively, with mineral flavours, a flicker of spice and a clean finish.



Fontanafredda Seralungad'Alba Barol2003

Barolo, made from the Nebbiolo variety, has been called both the 'king of wines' and the 'wine of kings' and it is undoubtedly one of the world's greatest. Traditionally fermented and aged for two years in oak, this was given a further extended period in bottle prior to release. It is a robustly intense wine, with cherry and damson aromas supported by hints of rose and tar. The spicy fruit, liquorice and leather flavours are enhanced by a weighty mouthfeel and a long tannin finish. It is a superb red, well priced and the equal of top Bordeaux. Worth cellaring.

Solar Viejo have gained a reputation for producing outstanding Tempranillo-based Rioja reds. This Crianza is bright ruby in colour and displays ripe cherry aromas underscored by toasty oak. Well rounded and balanced, it boasts good depth of fruit supported by oaky nuances, 14 and finishes on a long, satisfying note.

A lookatlesswellknown, nue and itmojuing wine toyes

There has been much use and abuse of this extraordinarily versatile grape variety, and it is that versatility that has probably accounted for the extreme range of uses to which Chenin is put. In warmer climate regions, like California and parts of Australia, it is grown in large volumes, maxed out high yields, so much of its wonderful aromatic and acidic character is lost, and then blended with Chardonnay or the rather innocuous Colombard to produce bland, easygoing quaffers which punters climb into by the vatful. Known as Steen in South Africa, it was blended and blanded there too for much of its history, with a few producers only now looking to make serious expressions of this great Loire grape.

It is in the Loire Valley, mainly in Anjou-Saumur and Touraine, where Chenin shows what it can achieve when handled correctly and vintage conditions are sympathetic. Names that may well be familiar, such as Quart de Chaume or the dry-styled Sauvennières, are made from Chenin. Of course if you've had Vouvray then you've drunk French Chenin, and from the chalky, mineral, floral dry styles through to the thrillingly sweet Moelleux expressions, Vouvray is a wine that is as scintillating as white wine gets. Chenin is often used as a base for sparkling wines also, its high acidity a natural for making Crémant de Loire, among others; and some of these, as with Vouvray, can actually live many, many years. There are wine lists around town currently selling Vouvray from the 1955 vintage; if you feel like splashing out, you could do a lot worse!

In New Zealand we really only have a handful of producers - and a mere 57ha currently planted - some who specialise and make wonderful expressions, such as Millton Vineyard in Gisborne, and others who make good, solid workhorse styles that offer a taste of something other than Pinot Gris or Chardonnay to the thirsty workers. Montana's Lindauer is mostly Chenin Blanc, grown (like the Millton's) in Gisborne; so it's likely that more of us have tried Chenin than we may have initially thought.

Check these Bourillon wines out though: they will show you, better than anything we can tell you, about the myriad complex joys that a French Chenin can offer. Careful though; once hooked, you're hooked for life.
