I've always been fond of our Dominion Rd store; it was the first that we opened outside our usual stomping ground of the CBD, Ponsonby, etc. and our first foray into a mostly suburban setting. With subsequent store openings in Westmere, Kingsland and Remuera, it would appear that the suburbs like us too, so Dom Rd proved to be the perfect punt. Lying in proximity as it does to Eden Park, I guess that's a bad pun, so we'll move on.

This bustling outlet has just taken on the mantle of being a corporate hub store for the area, meaning that they've acquired a van, a full-time driver and a whole bunch of stock. And just got even busier.

'It's been brilliant,' smiles the ever-effervescent store Manager, Simon Nicholas. His trusty sidekick and Assistant Manager, Jesse Yannotti, nods in enthusiastic agreement. Ramping up the customer service to include regular deliveries, to advise on functions, choose Friday night drinks and so forth 'just reflects how much busier the area has become,' says Simon. It also reflects the shift in clientele over the years, 'the demographic, to use marketing-speak,' smiles Jesse.

From being a quick stop for that one bottle purchase on the way home from work, or maybe a cheap vino on the way to a BYO ethnic restaurant, Dominion Rd now serves a huge host of regular clientele, people enthusiastic and interested in wine, who are prepared to try something a bit different and who are willing to take advice from the team, each one of whom has a specialist area.

'Austin, one of our long time full-timers, has built up the single malt section to reflect his knowledge,' says Simon, 'and so now he has a whole lot of people who will only speak to him when they come in. Jesse has the same thing going with people who will only listen to her wine advice; it's brilliant.' And reflects a maturing market, perhaps?

'Definitely,' the two chime together. 'People's purchases are much more quality-driven than they were even a year ago,' says Simon. 'People want wines that are ideal for dinner parties, or as gifts and so on, so we spend a lot of time talking to customers, getting an idea of what they know and what they want and then helping from there. It makes it much more enjoyable for everyone.'

In amongst the regulars are a continuing influx of new faces, says Jesse, herself an import from northern New Jersey when she arrived at the store nearly a year ago. 'Even in that time, I have seen a huge number of new people come in, and then they become regulars and so on,' she says. 'They like it because we know what they drink, or what they bought off us last time. It's a bit like Cheers, except instead of everyone knowing your name, we all know what you like to drink!'

With all the team, part-timers included, being genuine wine enthusiasts and having all completed the Glengarry Wine Academy courses, it would seem that friendly, knowledgeable advice, as clichéd as it may sound, is the key to success in the store. 'Exactly,' says Simon. 'We keep it simple and customer-oriented, and that seems to do the trick.'

Cabernet Sauvignon 2005

There is a piece of ancient Chinese wisdom that says, 'know when to stop and you can meet with no danger.' Wisely, New Zealand producers stopped trying to make wines like this, for the very reason that this one is here: the Aussies do them so well, so effortlessly and so cheaply that it was always going to be pointless to compete. This is just so ripe, so soft, no hard edges of any nature here at all; not of tannin, acid, nothing. Rich, lush, full of flavour, gutsy, jammy and cheap.



Argentine Malbec 2005

A triumph of South American elements, this is Argentine wine made by the acclaimed team at Montes in Chile. Intensely aromatic, where deep-scented berries meet damp, earthy rusticity, the fruit is sweet and ripe on the palate, a mocha tinge trips on through and the finish is full-on and vibrant.

Feature Winery

Cable Bay





One of the brightest stars in Waiheke Island's winery constellation is Cable Bay. Founded by Neill Culley and a small group of passionate shareholders, it has established a reputation for producing finely-crafted wines of distinction. Neill's original intention was to become a marine biologist. 'The plan was to study

for my Masters, but it was suggested I take time out and try something else. Wine seemed the way to go, so I went to Australia and completed a post graduate diploma in oenology at Roseworthy.' On his return to New Zealand, Neill joined Babich, initially as assistant winemaker and finally as Chief Winemaker. During his 12 year stint there, Neill gained an MBA and started planting the home vineyard on Waiheke.

First planted in 1998, Cable Bay's Waiheke vineyards are spread over several sites and feature Merlot, Cabernets Sauvignon and Franc, Malbec, Chardonnay, Syrah, Viognier and Pinot Gris. The company also has access to vineyards in Marlborough that provide Sauvignon Blanc, Riesling, Gewürztraminer and Pinot Noir. Neill states, 'The diversity of fruit from different vineyard sites gives us an excellent palette from which to blend, to achieve stylistic consistency.'

Until now, the Waiheke range of wines has been made at a West Auckland facility, but the 2008 wines will be produced at the new complex on Waiheke. The Marlborough range will continue to be made in Marlborough. 'Our aim is to produce high quality wines that have the ability to develop and that go well with food,' says Neill. This is artfully illustrated by a six-course, seasonally inspired degustation menu Cable Bay has introduced at their Waiheke complex.

The Cable Bay winery complex, a twenty minute walk or five minute cab ride from the ferry terminal, is nestled comfortably and unobtrusively into the hill-side off Nick Johnstone Drive, but it is inside the buildings that the attention to detail is best appreciated. The impressively coordinated buildings house a classy restaurant with outdoor courtyards, a wine bar, a tasting room, a private dining/conference room and a state-of-the-art production area, hewn out of the hillside, that incorporates a wine library, a barrel room and a gallery.

The ferry from downtown Auckland to Waiheke Island takes little more than forty minutes, but in that short time one is transported to a place where the tempo of life is so far removed from that of the city that it's hard to believe they are both part of the same geographic region. And the journey holds the promise of the exceptional wines and hospitality to be found at Cable Bay.

The palate is a fusion of gooseberry, herb and lime flavours with good weight and a lovely fresh crispness that cleans up the palate. Chill it, unscrew it and rejoice; it's a spanking good wine.

The blend consists of Merlot (53%), Cabernet Sauvignon (24%), Cabernet Franc (16%) and Malbec (7%) that has been harvested from five hillside vineyards. The integrated berry and spicy oak characters seamlessly follow through onto the palate, accentuating elegance rather than raw power. An excellent cellaring wine.

Tiers of flavours and nuances. accompanied by a suave texture, are balanced by a mineral-edged, lingering finish. Unquestionably good drinking.

The weighty palate has a creamy, fleshy texture, with just a lick of honeyed sweetness balanced by a fresh, clean finish.

The Viognier brings a freshness, floral loveliness and lushness to the affair, while the Chardonnay provides structure and no little finesse. The first ever Sacred wine was a Fumé Blanc, so it's perfect this barrel fermented rendition marks the occasion. wines that deliver more in the glass than their price-tag would suggest

Funny old word, 'value', and certainly one that means different things to different people. Every possible consumable appears to offer 'great value', 'added value' or some other vague promise, and it seems that those doing the promotion and advertising of such things haven't given much thought to what these terms really mean.

Well, we did give some thought to the term before we went and devoted a complete section of the wineletter to such a concept. We then had to give much consideration to the wines we chose to reflect the idea of value. The criteria, we decided, was that the wines had to deliver more in the glass than their price-tag would suggest.

Which is why we have wines ranging from seventeen to twentyeight dollars (normal retail); it's not about what the wines cost, it's about how well they drink compared to what they cost. A \$250 bottle of Champagne can deliver great value, if it exceeds what you'd expect at that price, just as a \$9.90 wine can be poor value if it's only fit to strip the bath.

The wines below, then, are a sort of Greatest Hits of our 'Everyday Drinking' section, and a few more besides; wines that won't remove a limb from you upon purchase (we've reduced them all from their usual retail pricing to emphasise the value-for-money argument), but will ensure that you always have an unbeatable bottle at hand for whenever you require it.

Ripe fruit, robust structure, excellent cellaring potential though most approachable now, and a great price tag. Grab loads.



And there are treats galore; earthy, toasty notes underpin a full-frontal-fruit fest (in a subdued French way, of course), while the supportive structure is what you'd expect from a well-regarded Bordeaux house.

Vidal

Hawkes Bay Merlot Cabernet 2006



Soft, mouthfilling and generous, this really is extraordinary value and primo quality in one package. Go wild.

Clifton Road

Hawkes Bay Sauvignon Blanc 2007

There's something about Hawkes Bay Sauvignon Blanc that makes a change from the herbaceous aggression of the world-famous Marlborough expressions. The palate is rich as the stretch of real estate that the name hints at, with all the above fruit notes and a tangy hint of lime just to make sure you're still paying attention. The finish is clean and refreshing as a dip in the ocean.



Freixenet

Cordon Negro Brut NV

This is textbook-perfection sparkling wine, ticking all the boxes. It has lower acid and sugar than most of its competition, so the acid heads who like a bit of puck can still glean mucho satisfaction from its vibrant palate, while those who find anything too dry an insult to their sensibilities can chug-a-lug this gleefully, basking in the soft fullness of the flavours as they head down the red lane. Yet there's plenty of character and vivacity, it has a spring in its step yet no sting in its tail. And it's a snip at \$10.90. Where's the bad bit?

Hoegaarden Forbidden Fruit Belgian Beer 330mL

As with all the Hoegaarden beers, this has a firm spice presence, a sprinkling of coriander and that distinctive orange zest note. Incongruous as this may sound, especially when you suggest that the Forbidden Fruit is a malty bevy, too, somehow it all works exquisitely. It also has that classic sweet & sour thing going on, a slight sweetness balances the spice and obvious malt characters. Yip, that alcohol count (8.8%) could bring on a scary body count, but it doesn't feel overly alcoholic, another trick that they've learned over the last 600 years of brewing. The label is worth a mention, too - the artists insist it is a nod to the great master Reubens; the Americans said it was Adam and Eve and they are naked, goddamit, and thus had issues with it. Hasn't anyone heard of irony?





For those with a sense of occasion, February means Waitangi Day and the forging of a Nation, but for those of us more romantically inclined, it's all about Valentines Day Sending red roses on Valentines Day as a declaration of undying devotion is a very sweet thought. But considering the pecuniary and cynical world we live in, the reaction might well be 'How do you love me? Let me count the roses.' Best to give Pol Roger Champagne; that way you can share in the pleasure, and maybe even pop the question, straight after the cork.

Santa Margherita

Prosecco di Valdobbiadene DOC Brut NV

These days the process is controlled, and the Spumante bubbles are created by the Charmat process. A pale wine with a steady stream of bubbles, it has a lovely aromatic bouquet hinting at stone-fruit and apple. Beautifully balanced, with an elegant and clean yet flavoursome palate, this is a superb aperitif and perfect with shellfish.



Pasqua sagramoso

Ripasso Valpolicella Superiore DOC 2004

It was then matured in barrel for 12 months. The distinctive bouquet displays morello cherry, red berry and herb aromas seasoned by a touch of oak. The palate is well structured, with forward fruit flavours enhanced by smooth, silky tannins.



If you're fond of well balanced reds with good weight and a lingering aftertaste that won't cost you the proverbial limbs, look no further. Aged in oak barrels for 12 months and a further 14 months in bottle, it has an oak-seasoned, spicy cherry bouquet. The palate has a fleshy feel, lovely supple tannins and a long, flavoursome finish.



It is fitting this month that we should take a look at the family-owned bodega (winery) of Portugal's Quinta de la Rosa, for we are privileged to have one of the family, Sophia Bergqvist, visiting at the end of February. Sophia can answer all those port questions that you've always wanted to ask, while we can give you a quick overview of this fascinating producer.

Sophia's father, Tim Bergqvist, inherited the vineyards (quintas) and winery from his mother, Claire, who was gifted these prime sites, high above the Douro River, as a christening present in 1906. Yip, most girls get a charm bracelet, but I guess they do things a bit differently in Portugal. While family history and respect for tradition is the essential lifeblood at De La Rosa, Sophia and Tim have not been backward in coming forward, and since the early 1990s, they have expanded the brand to include the production of high-quality red table wine from the Douro region.

That said, it is the family's ports that have gained fame the world over, and in the face of big brand domination and increasing homogeny of styles, it is exciting to drink ports that reflect both their unique terroir and the fiercely individualistic approach to winemaking of the family themselves.




