'I'm not homesick,' Thomas St-Pic insists as I duck in out of a gruelling storm into his pristine Takapuna store. I think of Bordeaux, Thomas' birthplace, shimmering in the high 20's, and wonder if he doth protest too much. 'I love it here,' he beams broadly. With his knowledge of all things Bordeaux, and Spanish and, frankly, most other wine regions you care to name, it's certainly a great thing for the store's ever-expanding customer base, too.

Thomas' first (and most gruelling) appointment was as wine manager of the massive retail hypermarket, E. Leclerc in Bordeaux. Being Bordeaux, the wine sections of these outlets attract huge attention. Thomas was in charge of 1500 labels, purchasing them, setting the prices, and then making sure they sold. While the 80 hour weeks and massive quarterly sales were difficult, Thomas says he did get to meet every player in the Bordeaux wine industry. 'It was like being at Vin Expo all the time,' he says.

After another high-pressure retail position, Thomas and his partner decided that a complete change of environment was what they needed, and New Zealand provided it. He quickly got himself through the doors at Glengarry, and here he is, with his French music chirping through the shop and his retail experience showing in the columns of neatly stacked displays throughout the store.

He's loving the experience, particularly enjoying tasting vast quantities of local wine and food to get himself up to speed. 'I don't know of any wine company in Europe delivering a monthly food and wine tasting as Glengarry does,' he tells me. Also, wine at home has been a way of educating himself. 'A good wine with a good meal is the best thing in the world.' And as for keeping the connection to home, having settled here, they did name their newborn baby daughter Margaux.

So next time you're wandering through the, er, sunny beachside hamlet of Takapuna, drop in and have a chat to Thomas; he'll engage you in a robust discussion about the next Rugby World Cup winner while giving you personal insight into any Bordeaux wine you care to mention. And all the while, the accordion sings away in the background.

Exploding with a torrent of tropical fruit, there's an edgy, restless herbaceousness which keeps it keen, while a wonderful mid-palate weight and richness suggests seafood would enhance it joyously.



Feature Winery





Spy Valley describes itself as a family-owned, global boutique winery; eighty percent of the wine they produce is exported to markets all over the world. Bryan and Jan Johnson pioneered viticulture in the Marlborough sub-region of the Lower Waihope Valley when they established the 120-hectare vineyard in 1993. The district was considered unsuitable for wine production, but time has proved that it is one of Marlborough's finest cool climate vineyards. Initially, the Johnsons operated as contract growers supplying grapes to wineries, but in 2000 they released the first vintage under the Spy Valley label.

The early wines were made in a Marlborough facility, but since 2003 they have been produced at the company's own winery located in the middle of the estate vineyards. The winery is entirely self sufficient; the winemaking facilities are all temperature controlled, and bottling, labelling and cellaring are all within the complex. 'By having the winery in the heart of our estate vineyard, we can process the fruit in prime condition. And by having the entire operation under one roof we can maintain good quality control from picking to dispatch,' says General Manager Blair Gibbs.

The plantings of Sauvignon Blanc, Riesling, Pinot Gris, Pinot Noir, Merlot and Malbec at the family's Johnson Estate vineyard are managed by Adam Code, who has been with the company for some years. The Estate vineyard supplies the bulk of Spy Valley's needs. Says Blair Gibbs, 'We source some Sauvignon Blanc from other growers; it provides the winemaking team wider flavour profiles and it's is also an insurance against climatic risk.'

The winemaking team, headed by Paul Bourgeois (a Kiwi, in spite of his French name) has produced a string of award-winning wines that have earned accolades from leading wine critics around the world. Spy Valley produces three tiers of wines, two of which are featured here. The Spy Valley-branded wines are made to display pure varietal and regional characters. The fruit is sourced from the company's Waihope Valley vineyards and from selected sites in Marlborough. The premium Envoy wines are produced from selected micro-sites on the Johnson Estate that experience has shown consistently deliver the best fruit.

In a remarkably short time, Spy Valley has fashioned a remarkable record for quality and established itself as one of the country's top wineries. Blair Gibbs states that their aim is to produce premium world-class wines that over deliver consistently.







THE SACRED HILL SPECIAL SELECTION ANNUAL RELEASE


August 2008 signals the annual release of Sacred Hill's Special Selection range. 40 members of the Glengarry team went to Hawke's Bay in August to taste the range with Sacred Hill's Senior Winemaker, Tony Bish, and all were mightily impressed by the quality of the wines.

Tony explained that the Special Selection range is a collection he makes for his love of the wines; not produced to make commercial sense, they are the winemaker's personal expressions.

This years release consists of Brokenstone Merlot, Prospector Pinot Noir, Helmsman Cabernet Sauvignon, Riflemans Chardonnay and Deerstalkers Syrah. The annual release this year does not include the Sauvage Sauvignon Blanc.

Did you know this is the world's biggest-selling single malt? Twelve years battened down in oak casks, this Highland malt is as rich and smooth as Sean Connery without the annoying accent. Fruit rises above the wood on the nose, while the palate is an exquisitely integrated combination of wet forest, luscious pears and that inimitable peatiness, the latter lingering on to the seamless finish. And for the note-takers, Glenfiddich is the only Highland single malt distilled, matured and bottled at its own distillery.

Springbank 10-Year-Old Single Malt Scotch Whisky

Aged mainly in bourbon casks; some sherry casks are used as well, giving the rich, full palate a slightly sweet lift that beautifully offsets the salty tang which is ubiquitous in the Springbank whiskies. The nose is initially fruity, its whimsicality tempered by a smoky surge of peat, while the palate is a cornucopia of exotic flavours, from vanillin hints to nutmeg and cinnamon spices.



Caol Illa

12-Year-Old Single Malt Scotch Whisky

Very much hidden away in the craggy wilds of Islay, accessible only to those with stout boots and a sturdy physique, this distillery with a name that translates as 'sound of Islay' dates back to 1846. Like so many, it has had an up and down ride to its current state. But the dram is why we're here. Considered lighter in style for an Islay, it still has an iodine/medicinal whiff and a peaty base upon which lie floral and fruited flavours. It starts slightly sweet, then progresses through to a charred, bone-dry finish. Intriguing as it is





My, haven't spirits come a long way. Or should I say, hasn't the category grown in synergy and dynamism. Where a bright label and a discount sticker used to move mountains, or at least palettes, now we've got websites where chicks flutter their eyelids at you and the barman taps impatiently while you decide how you'd like your goose, er, cooked. Indeed the vodka is slick and stylish inside and out, oil free but flavour full. Question: If you've had more than one, does that mean you've had a few Grey Geese or Gooses?

While vodka has dominated the hipsters' drinking habits (that's you guys) over the past decade, gin is roaring back, mainly buoyed by the increased interest in cocktails which, before children came and messed with them, were based largely on, well, gin. This 'brazen', high-end brand was launched only a couple of years ago, the company being founded by an investment banker and a chap from Skyy vodka. Distilled four times with myriad botanicals it has smooth, seductive fruit, citrus notes and it has a dog collar (studded, naturellement). Barking, but pleasantly tame.

When you start getting aromas from your beer that lean towards green apples and citrus fruit with hints of nuts, cor blimey, you begin to understand why beer tasting is taken as seriously as wine tasting by a not insignificant number of people. Surprisingly thirst quenching, this is also richly satisfying, a mouthfilling ale with generous malty flavours and a refreshing zing from the crisp hops. At 6.5%, we politely suggest you have your bus pass on hand; you wouldn't want to drive, and not too many local taxi drivers understand Flemish.

Moa Five Hop Winter Lager

375mL single \$6.90 91337

Weka, Moa, Kiwi, Tui? I guess we can expect a Pukeko Pilsner sometime soon. Anyway, Josh-son-of-Allan Scott has made quite a name for himself with his excellent range of Moa beers and this, Moa's first ale, is made the same way as all the other Moas, following the Méthode Traditionnelle that is used to produce Champagne. A powerful beer, malty and creamy with a hint of sweetness, the coup de grâce being the hoppy floral characters that bounce off the top.





Weka Native Lager

330mL 4-pack \$9.90 91339

This is brewed at the Mussell Inn (geddit?) which is located handily at, er Onekaka, itself situated on that beautiful north-east/south-west sweep of Golden Bay. They also bring you (or at least the locals) Swinelager and Heat Rash, which is a chilli beer, in case you hadn't worked that out. And why are they brewing beer in an area renowned for macramé pot holders? Pure mountain water, Petunia. To add some character to that pristine beginning, the ale is matured in bourbon barrels, lending a caramel tone to its dark stoutiness.



Dux Hereford Bitter Dark Munich Lager

330mL single **\$4.90** 91367

Herefords are a breed of cow, isn't they guv? Then you've got Dux, which would suggest, well, Daffy and friends, but it all actually comes down to Dux de Lux, a company with a couple of funky dining rooms, one in Christchurch and one in Queenstown. The latter has the brewery on-site, where they make a range of top flight bevies, this being one of them. They call the Hereford a dark, Munich-style lager, with full-on maltiness and a surprisingly non-bitter aftertaste.



330mL single \$4.90 91365

Showing that they're no one-trick pony, these guys got all their dux in a row (oops) and picked up a gold at the Aussie International Beer Awards. They then secured a gold for 'Best New Zealand Lager' at the NZ Beer Awards just a couple of years back, against some competition who probably have a bigger budget for paper clips than these guys have for their entire outfit. Go the little people! Slightly citrusy and charmingly refreshing, it's a weighty but fleet of foot lager with an invigoratingly clean finish.



GINGER

Dux Ginger Tom Ginger Beer

330mL single \$4.90 91366

Not often you get a ginger beer that's actually beer, if you know what I mean. But they don't muck around at Dux, and this has an alcoholic strength of 4%. 'A night on the gingers' is not as lame as it sounds, although it does sound a little creepy, I guess. The pre-requisite for a decent ginger beer is spice, and this has it in spades, sprinkled liberally through the fizzing fruit, giving it that refreshing lift you'd expect. There are delicious hints of honey and lemon, too, a slight maltiness and a very crisp twist of the tail. Paw me another...

UStralia a taste of

Rediscover the wines of the lucky country with our pick of the best and most exciting Aussies on offer

The Australian 'Wine Lake' that has been delivering us bargain-priced bulk wine is now history. Last year, London's Daily Telegraph reported that the price of Australian wine was predicted to soar as the country's crippling drought threatened to halve the coming grape crop. The 2008 vintage was almost 35% below the five-year average, the prolonged period of drought considered the worst experienced by the wine industry.

With global warming a scientific reality, the situation is unlikely to improve. Growers in the vast, irrigated Murray-Darling region of South Australia, Victoria and New South Wales may have to abandon their vineyards because of the growing lack of access to water. The bulk of Australia's wine is derived from these regions, but the much reduced 2008 vintage will push up grape prices, ending the three year grape glut that produced cheap

The good news is that the smaller boutique wineries, more dependent on sustainable winemaking, have not been as seriously affected; their wines offer excellent, affordable quality.

Kaesler

Old Vine Barossa Valley Viognier 2007

Kaesler's third Viognier release Only 250 cases made

The Kaesler family settled in the Barossa valley in the 1840s, and planted the first dry-grown vines in 1893, which are still producing today. Kaesler produce less than 300 cases per vintage of estate-grown Viognier. The fruit is hand harvested, whole bunch pressed and fermented on wild yeasts in new and seasoned French barrels, then lees aged to add textural complexity. It is a wonderfully aromatic wine with apricot, pineapple and spicy oak nuances. The palate has a creamy feel that melds beautifully with the fruit. A rare treat.





The Prophet McLaren Vale Shiraz 2005

Chapel Hill's Michael Fragos was named Winemaker of the Year at London's 2008 International Wine and Spirit Competition

If The Prophet Shiraz is anything to judge by, Chief Winemaker Michael Fragos' award was well deserved. The grapes were sourced from McLaren Vale, long considered one of the best wine regions in the world for the variety. This is a big wine, boasting a deep, brooding colour and some bursting pepper, plum, and ripe berry aromas supported by smoky oak. It's a richly flavoured red with an abundance of spicy fruit and a long, lush finish.

Cockatoo Ridge Cabernet Merlot 2005

It is a fruit-driven wine with a well weighted and generously flavoured palate.



The classic varietal aromas echo spice coffee and vanillin oak, and the multi-layered palate has an abundance of rich, ripe fruit flavours complemented by 11 a slick texture and a lingering finish.

A monthly selection of affordable French wine from our extensive range

The Côtes du Rhône AOC (Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée) covers the entire Rhône Valley and comprises over 80% of the total volume produced; these are mostly red wines, but there are also some rosés and whites.

The AOC was created in 1937, and in 1996 the initial regulations were tightened regarding allowable varieties, yields and blends, stipulating that red wines must contain at least 40% Grenache with Syrah and Mourvèdre. The regulations came into being in 2004, and have raised the quality of the basic level of generic Rhône reds.

The AOC covers the 171 villages that do not have their own appellation. Spread over such a large area, it produces a diverse range of wines from the variety of microclimates and soils, the combination of varieties in the blends and the vinification methods employed.

Almost 70% of generic Côtes du Rhône wines are made in cooperatives, but the most satisfying wines, with longer keeping potential, are usually produced by single estates, domaines and established grower/producer/ merchants like Paul Jaboulet and Mont-Redon. Made in smaller quantities, these usually contain significant proportions of Syrah, are deeper in colour, are more concentrated and have firm tannin structures. The best of them represent exceptional value.

Paul Jaboulet

Côtes du Rhône Selection 2006

Rhône records show that the Jaboulets have been in the wine business since at least 1834, if not longer. The wine is characterized by a swathe of ripe berry and plum aromas and flavours integrated artfully with some subtle oak. Superb Value.

Different in style to the 2006, it's drier and crisper than its predecessor. A stunning wine, possibly Claude's best yet.

Château Lugagnac has a very long history, built as it was at the time of the Hundred Years War (1337-1453). From the excellent 2006 vintage, this is a complex, fruit forward wine with black currant and cassis aromas nicely integrated with toasty oak. Richly structured, slightly fleshy and harmonious, it has ripe tannins and a lingering finish.

a taste of

Theoretically, Italian wines have been governed by laws since Roman times, but for most of their history those laws have been largely ignored. Responsible winemakers lobbied Parliament for years to introduce regulations that would protect the authenticity of their wines, and eventually, in 1963, the DOC (denominazione di controllata) laws were introduced.

The classifications start with VdT (Vino de Tavola) for basic wines that do not indicate variety, vintage or geographic origins. A step up from VdT are the IGT (Indicazione Geographica Tipica) wines; these must state the variety and geographic region.

The DOC classification is applied to wines made from specific varieties in delimited zones, processed and aged by set methods to meet prescribed standards of alcohol, colour aroma and acidity. The laws aim for quality but do not ensure it. In 1982 a super DOC, the DOCG, was introduced; the G stands Garantita, or guarantee.

This is the top tier and is reserved for the finest wines. The regulations are much stricter regarding yields, and each wine is analyzed and tasted by a panel. The DOC laws have brought a greater sense of cohesion to the Italian wine industry, and improved the quality and status of Italian wine.

> Cecchi Chianti DOCG 2006

The Cecchi Family firmly believe that the heart of Chianti is the Sangiovese grape. In their estates they have been replanting with clones better-suited to individual sites, and this has paid dividends; Cecchi's Chiantis are among the most consistent in the entire region. The 2006 is a superbly crafted wine and offers great value. It has a bouquet of black cherry, violet and spicy oak, while the fruit-dominated palate is well integrated, velvety smooth and long flavoured.

Valdadige Pinot Grigio DOC 2007

This is a pale greenish wine with an elegant bouquet displaying apple and pear aromas with traces of mineral and spice. Well balanced and nicely weighted, it has well defined fruit and a fresh, lively finish.

Pasqua V Valpolicella DOC 2006

Along with Chianti, Valpolicella is Italy's best-known red wine, which is not surprising since there probably isn't an Italian restaurant anywhere that does not feature one or both of these wines. Pasqua's 'V' is a dry, well weighted red with an attractively fragrant nose of strawberry and raspberry, with hints of herb and mineral. The juicy, well balanced palate is nicely rounded and finishes on a long savoury note.



Bolla

Pinot Grigio IGT 2007

With its bouquet of cassis, black cherry and spicy oak, the richly flavoured palate is balanced and structured around a core of supple tannins.





Bolla Torralta

Produced by the Charmat process, this has a persistent stream of golden bubbles. The aromatic bouquet shows fine apple-scented characters, and the wine comes alive in the mouth with the dominant fruit flavours enhanced by a silky feel and balanced by a slash of citrus and a hint of 13 sweetness at the finish. Versatile and refreshing.

Spain is searingly hot, and we have our fingers in the paellas of the premium new producers

Sherry is one of the world's most versatile, under-rated and misunderstood wines. The way it is made, matured and blended is very different to other wines, because it is fortified with brandy after fermentation.

Made from the Palomino Fino variety, the style of Sherry is determined by a natural phenomenon called 'flor'. Flor is a white veil of yeast that grows and feeds on the surface of the wine, preventing oxidation and imparting a characteristic pungency. The Sherries that develop flor are the Fino and Manzanilla styles, and those that do not are classified as Oloroso, and are often sweetened with Pedro Ximénez for the cream styles.

Both basic types are fermented to dryness and placed in a 'solera,' a blending system consisting of a group of wine butts of different ages known as the criadera or nursery. When wine is required for bottling or blending, a percentage is drawn from the oldest butt and replenished with the next oldest wine. Thus the younger wines take on the character of the older wines, maintaining the style and quality year after year. Dry and pungent, Fino Sherry is a superb aperitif that's best enjoyed slightly chilled, and once opened, should be consumed before it loses its freshness.

Marqués de Cáceres

Rosado 2007

Based in the Rioja Alta sub-region, Marqués de Cáceres is one of the most influential wineries in Spain. Its selection of wines has been a revelation for their varietal purity and sense of place. This Rosado, or Rosé, is appealingly stylish, excellent as an aperitif and a versatile food wine. A pale salmon colour, it has fragrant and delicate spicy strawberry aromas, while the palate is nicely balanced, with soft fruit flavours that linger on in the bright finish.



Protos Roble **2006**

Spanish wines labelled 'Roble' are usually younger wines that spend less than six months in oak barrels. Produced from Tempranillo, this was traditionally fermented and aged for four months in French oak, allowing the fruit to shine through. The bouquet has cherry and plum aromas mingling with herb and understated vanillin oak. The fruit-driven palate is well balanced, with the ripe berry and plum flavours supported by chocolate and cinnamon nuances. It has a wonderfully silky mouthfeel and a nice dusting of supple tannins. Great value and ready to enjoy.

Solar Viejo Cosecha 2006

Quite how Solar Viejo manage to produce a wine that offers so much at this price is nothing less than extraordinary. It has a firm backbone of suave tannins and a lingering, flavoursome finish.





Minotauro Azul 2004

The ripe berry aromas are supported by cinnamon and vanilla notes. Beautifully balanced, it is deliciously ripe and velvety smooth.

This is a blend of 85% Tempranillo, with the balance made up of Garnacha and Graciano, aged for 12 months in oak and a further 14 months in bottle. The lively bouquet has morello cherry and strawberry aromas seasoned with vanillin oak, and the complex fruit flavours are nicely integrated with spicy oak. Velvety smooth.


