

From the man who makes 10% of the region's wine, a mere 25 million cases and counting, this is a very characterful, flirtatious fellah, with red-fruited panache, tangy acid and an outrageous sense of its own drinkability. Cool? Charm.



Esk Valley Hawke's Bay Merlot Cabernet Sauvignon Malbec 2007

Few make Hawke's Bay Merlot better than the Esk folk, and this is yet another in a long list of intensely flavoured but approachable, affordable Merlot blends that have issued forth over the years. At first inhalation your inclination is to think black forest cake and chocolate berry tortes (indeed a legitimate leaning), but the chewy palate offers even more than that with its dazzling array of plums, wild hillside herbs and splinters of finely emerging wood notes.

Mills Reef Reserve

Hawke's Bay Chardonnay 2007

Milling around the reef, we chanced upon this definitive example of Hawke's Bay Chardonnay and, you know, sometimes to get exactly what you expect can be very rewarding. Fully ripe, excellent quality fruit from two very different sites does the swirly-whirly-in-the-woody thing and comes out all thick and creamy, gurgling with masses of peachy stonefruit flavours and aromas. It's that creaminess that'll woo you, a texture of such luscious intensity that you may reach for a ladle rather than a glass.

Geoff Merrill McLaren Vale Shiraz Grenache Mourvèdre 2005

That flashing colour in the glass reminds us we're getting a wine of some age for less than twenty notes. Beautifully fruity on the nose, you get jostled by moving plums at first look, then nudged awake by a slight Aussie menthol and dark chocolate note. Restrained oak accentuates the ripe, spicy fruit, older vines and great handling come through with earth, the tannins swagger in with structure.



Feature Vinery



Affectionately known a the Baron of the Barossa, Peter Lehmann has become, according to the eminent Australian wine writer James Halliday, a legend in his own lifetime. A whole generation of the Barossa Valley's winegrowers would probably agree, as he saved many of them from ruin.

At seventeen Peter Lehmann joined Yalumba, working under the influential winemaker Rudi Kronberger. In 1960 he was appointed winemaker/manager at Saltram Wines, a position he held for twenty years. During that time, he developed a strong and enduring friendship with Barossa growers, with deals done on a handshake. During the overproduction crisis, the multinational Saltram ordered Peter to renege on his word to winegrowers. He refused, unwilling to see the growers go broke.

Instead, he formed the Barossa Masterton Vignerons Pty Limited, a company outside Saltram which crushed 12,000 tonnes of local grower's fruit, saving many from bankruptcy. The operation produced two vintages, but another change in Saltram's ownership was the catalyst that propelled Peter to start his own winery, and thus secure a long-term future for Barossa's growers and vineyards.

Together with some investment partners he established a consortium, and in 1979 built the Peter Lehmann Wines winery. The first vintage was processed in 1980, and since that time Peter Lehmann Wines has become one of Australia's most successful enterprises. In 2008, Peter Lehmann Wines was once again named Australian Wine Producer of the Year at the London International Wine & Spirit Competition. This is the third time since 2000 that the company has been awarded this prestigious trophy.

After 55 vintages Peter has retired from winemaking, but is still active, his loyalty and commitment to the Barossa and its growers undiminished. The company practises sustainable winemaking, and while it owns four vineyards, it carefully sources grapes from selected growers, some from families that have tended the same vineyards for six generations. Hence Peter Lehman wines are a true expression of Barossa's gamut of terroirs.

Peter Lehmann's National PR Manager and wine personality Malcolm Stopp will be joining us on May 12 at Glengarry Victoria Park to conduct a tasting of these outstanding wines.

The deliciously fragrant nose is evocative of spring blossom, lemon zest and cream, while the palate has a lively, zingy character that gives the fruit a deliciously crisp mouthfeel.



This gets three years of lees maturation, which is a long time to wait for your money. One wonders if the defining characteristic of a winemaker is perhaps patience. Anyway, this includes some proportion of reserve wines, a truly French phenomenon, and these age in oak, á la Bollinger and Krug. That's commitment. A very refined, elegant style that also packs a mouthfilling punch of citrus flavours and yeastderived nuttiness, this is a New Zealand classic that has quietly accumulated critical and popular acclaim with minimal fuss.

Creamy, mouthfilling and soft, with undercurrents of yeast and a citrus twinge, yet there's great acid down the side of the mouth that controls the flow of the palate to perfection. Is there a slight, honeyed, almost Muscat touch there? One of the best local methodes we've seen in an ice age.



We recently had the privilege of hosting Monsieur Drappier, who did mention the tale of the monk who brought the first Pinot cutting from Burgundy to Champagne; incredibly, Mr D still has it preserved under his office floor (the cutting, not the monk). And did you know? Drappier wines are deliberately low in SO2, so less dosage is required than normal, and they have the oldest dosage liqueur in Champagne.

The house that was to become Lanson was established in 1760 by a chapottle by the name of Francois Delamotte, a familiar name to some. The expressions the panel tasted had shed that armour, and were soft and mouthfilling with an undercurrent of yeast and richness.



Everything great Champagne should be, this is exquisite, from the packaging to the copper-tinged sphericals that dramatically defy gravity, through to the haunting, beautiful floral/berry fragrance and the wine itself; poised, elegant and balanced, richly finessed, finely drawn, divine to drink. This makes Daniel Craig look scruffy, yet at the same time, it's so giddyingly playful. What a winner.





Top New Zealand wineries and their second labels

The concept of 'second wines' probably began (and continues) in Bordeaux, where fruit that may have initially been earmarked for the Grand Vin was at assemblage stage 'downgraded' to a secondary label. Often this was because certain parcels had characteristics that weren't typical of the main wine, or came from vines that were younger, with more upfront appeal but perhaps less potential for ageing. The reasons, like the labels, are myriad.

The wineries featured here who have developed second-tier wines, secondary labels, sub-brands, call them what you will, have likewise done so for a variety of reasons. Often, the brand's growth instigates extending their original range; sometimes they want to experiment with style without developing inconsistency in their first wines; sometimes they want to provide a broad fanbase with a more affordable, approachable style than their famous first wine.

It's fun to compare the similarities and the differences from brand to brand, and to take the opportunity to tell the story of each brand and its brother. One thing needs to be made very clear; the second wines are not second rate. No sir. They are different from the main label for reasons mentioned above, a divergent expression of terroir and winemaking style and process. Enthusiasts often take to a winery's second label over its first; and remember, too, that so-called second labels in Bordeaux still command hundreds of dollars a bottle.

Palliset encarro

Palliser Estate

Oozing class, and no small measure of intense cherry and plum flavours, it's bristling with vibrancy and brooding with intent. Magnificent.

A drink-now, flavoursome style with punchy Pinot fruit and plenty of structure.

Rockburn

A great opportunity exists here to compare the same vintage, same winery and same variety, but different brands. So we did. Yep, there's an obvious off-dry tinge to the proceedings, balanced against incredibly rich, vibrant fruit, a firm acid backbone and an already poised and balanced finish. Wonderful style, and a great expression of the variety.



Devil's Staircase

Whereas down the winding staircase, we're still well-served by finesse, style and more flavour than you could shake a gnarly stick at. The Devil is seductively sweeter, still off-dry rather than medium, and most definitely not cloying; just luscious and appealing and bouncing off the walls with flavour, which seems to be a Devils Staircase trademark. Nashi pears, melons and passionfruit are licked into shape by citrus zest in an approachable, vivacious style.



Mt Difficult Roaving Mes

Much is made of Central Otago Pinot Noir, and often overlooked are the Chablisean-styled Chardonnays. With razor's edge balance and concentrated, powerful flavours, this will appeal to coolclimate fans who like their Chardonnays along precise, clean lines.

Steve Smith MW and his band of merry folk have made a huge impact in a short space of time. Concentrated, and soundly structured, it's a brilliant cellaring prospect. But I'd sneak a bottle now and then; just to see how it's going, of course.







It is impossible to profile Villa Maria without mentioning the remarkable contribution that founder and managing director George Fistonich has made to the company, and to the New Zealand wine industry.

George's single-minded approach, passion and entrepreneurial flair have earned him a remarkable number of awards; the National Business Review named him New Zealander of the year in 2004, and he was listed as one of fifty prominent figures in the wine industry by UK Wine International.

BUYGUNDY

Burgundy produces some of the greatest wines in the world, but sorting out what's there can be frustrating. It is the most terroir-conscious wine region in France, with more than 600 individual appellations. Its AC system guarantees the origin of the wine, not its quality; theoretically, the smaller and more precise the appellation, the higher the quality. At the top of the pecking order are the Grand Cru ACs, followed by the Premier Crus; a rung down are individual village appellations and specific regional appellations, like Chablis or Haute-Côte de Nuits, down to Bourgogne AC, which covers the whole region.

There are approximately forty Grand and Premier Crus that produce Burgundy's finest wines. They are located only in Chablis and the Côte d'Or. This world famous strip consists of two zones; the Côte de Nuits, which produces Burgundy's most concentrated reds, and Côte de Beaune, home to fine reds and some of the region's greatest whites. Chablis is noted for its pure, mineral-edged Chardonnays.

Thanks to the Burgundian laws of inheritance, vineyards with individualACs are fragmented and owned by dozens of small-scale growers. These small holders find it convenient and commercially viable to sell their wines to negociants, who blend and market the wines under each appellation. The last fifty years has seen the emergence of an increasing number of go-it-alone individuals who grow, blend and bottle single estate burgundies. The quantities of these domaine-bottled wines are invariably small, but they are among Burgundy's best and most authentic expressions.

Medium-bodied, fresh cherry flavours develop through the mid-palate and mingle with herbal notes. Nicely rounded, with a supple backbone of well integrated tannins.

Sangiovese (pronounced san-jo-vay-zay) is Italy's most commonly-planted red grape variety. Most authorities believe it originated in Tuscany and was known in its original wild form to the Etruscans.

The name Sangiovese is derived from the Latin 'sanguis Jovis' or 'blood of Jove,' and like that mythological Roman God, Sangiovese has a changeable personality. As with Pinot Noir, the variety is genetically prone to mutation, and there are a least fourteen Sangiovese clones.


Sangiovese grows well in a variety of soils; it generally has relatively thin skins, matures slowly and ripens late in the season, and thus prefers a hot, dry climate like Tuscany's.

It does not have assertive aromatics; the bouquet is suggestive of strawberry, blueberry, violet, plum and some faintly floral characters. Sangiovese produces a broad range of wines that includes novella, rosato, frizzante and sweet passito styles. It is famously the main component of Chianti blends. These wines can be light, medium-weighted and display diverse flavours of morello cherry, plum, violet, tomato, earthy nuances and spicy, tarry oak influence.

Pasqua

Le Collezioni Sangiovese IGT 2007

The Sangiovese grapes were selected from vineyards located in the western tip of Sicily. To promote fresh fruit flavours the wine was fermented at controlled temperatures in stainless steel tanks and put through malolactic to add softness to the palate. It is an early drinking style with youthful purple flashes. The nose expresses classic varietal aromas of violet, black cherry and hints of herb swirling in the background. On the palate it shows a good depth of ripe tasting fruit enhanced by supple tannins and a long finish.

The palate is nicely weighted and fresh, with well-defined fruit complemented by a svelte texture and a fine, longish finish.

RIOUA

Produced in the northeast of the country in the narrow, landlocked valley of the River Ebro, Rioja is unquestionably Spain's most famous red wine. With Spain's only DOCa classification, the highest in the country, Rioja's prime ingredients are the indigenous varieties Tempranillo and Garnacha.

Tempranillo ripens two weeks earlier than Garnacha; it produces deeply coloured, richly flavoured wines with Pinot Noir-like strawberry characteristics. Tempranillo wines can be light bodied, so it is usually blended with Garnacha to add body.

Many Riojas are blends of wines grown in its three geologically and climatically diverse sub-regions; the cooler Alta and Alvesa, dominated by Tempranillo, and the warmer, Garnacha-leaning Baja.

The common denominator is the unmistakeable influence of sweet vanilla oak, a legacy of French vignerons who arrived in Rioja in the 19th century. They introduced their winemaking techniques together with the oak barrique maturation that has become the hallmark of the Rioja style.

Recent years have seen the emergence of a new wave of winemakers who have embraced modern technology to produce modern, well made and smartly-priced wines that are uniquely Spanish in character.

Palacios Remondo

La Vendimia Rioja 2007



This is a serious wine, with layers of berryfruit, nutmeg, plum and coffee enhanced by some judicious oak and a firm structure.


