

Waiheke Island, vinous crowning glory of the Hauraki Gulf, boasts a number of jewels among its wineries,

and surely one of the brightest gems is Cable Bay. The winery was founded in 1996 by its Chief Winemaker, Neill Culley, together with a small group of people passionate about New Zealand wine.

Accredited by Sustainable Wine Growing New Zealand, the company's five Waiheke Island vineyards are located on unique sites, providing a range of fruit with different attributes.

In addition, Cable Bay sources grapes from 'grower friends' in Central Otago and Marlborough. Regardless of regional origin, the wines are all made at their impressive state-of-the-art winery complex. Neill Culley says, 'We take an Old World approach and combine it with New World techniques to produce opulent, stylish wines that reflect the land where they began.'

The focus is on producing small lots of separate parcels of fruit from the various vineyards to create wines with their own personality, balanced with layers of flavour and interest. Neill states, 'Our aim is to produce a wine where the last glass from the bottle is better than the first. Wines which capture our attention and imagination.'

Just a ferry ride from downtown Auckland, the Cable Bay Winery is well worth a visit, its stylish buildings housing a top-class restaurant, a tasting area and a private dining/conference room, along with the collection of interesting art works residing in its outdoor courtyards.

#### Ripe fruit flavours with a refreshing edge

The fruit was harvested from two Marlborough sub-regions, each providing distinctive characteristics. The wine was cool fermented to retain aromatic definition and freshness, and several months of lees aging has provided a degree of complexity and textural richness. It displays integrated aromas of tropical fruit, peach and capsicum, while the palate is dominated by ripe fruit flavours, beautifully balanced by a rasp of refreshing citrus.

#### Excellent food wine; nuances of peach and spice

A blend from five vineyards, fermented in French barriques, with about 20% allowed to go through natural fermentation. After ten months of maturation on lees, the final blend displays a complex, integrated bouquet, with peach and understated spicy oak aromas and flavours supported by biscuity characters. It is an excellent food wine, with waves of flavours resonating throughout.

#### Complex, richly flavoured, outstanding

Anyone harbouring doubts about the quality of Waiheke Island reds should try this outstanding Bordeaux varietal blend. The fruit was hand harvested from five meticulously managed, low-yielding vineyards. After primary and malolactic fermentations, the wine was matured for 12 months in French oak. Complex and richly flavoured, with nuances of plum, berry, coffee and cedar and a supple tannin structure.

#### Fragrant nose with a ripe, clean, creamy palate

The hand harvested fruit was cool fermented in stainless steel tanks and a small portion lees-aged in seasoned French oak barriques to add greater dimension. The weighty palate has excellent depth of ripe fruit, a creamy texture and a fine, clean finish.

Now we're talking. Let's face it, Dom's not a wine, it's an event. An Aladdin's Cave of sensual experiences, the nose is clean and fresh, with hints of gardenia, smoke, citrus and more, while the palate is a slowbuild slowdive of rich fruits boldly spiced with ginger and other exotic scents and tastes. Outstandingly fresh, the rewards are manifold now, but cellar it and you'll be the talk of your town.









The thing with borders, if you all grab your atlases, is you'll find, particularly in Europe, that they are man-made, and thus often divide countries, regions and therefore cultures in an almost random fashion. With Spain and Portugal both undergoing something akin to vinous revolutions, and with those revolutions happening in markedly similar ways – uneconomic winemaking processes abandoned, seemingly uneconomic vineyards restored to their former glories, and so forth – we thought it would pay to treat the two as one, and view the Iberian Peninsula as a whole.

Far from lumping everyone in together, what's interesting are the similarities that pop up as, region by region, we take a look, via the wines being produced, at what's happening on the ground and, indeed, in it.

Up till 15 or 20 years ago, both countries were dismissed in many quarters as producing difficult, brawny, tannic reds, while the whites were judged by press and punters alike as hard and flavourless. Not all the wines and not all the press, but in a general sense, such has been the fate of the Iberian Peninsular. Oh, of course, we love your ports, Luis and, yes, some Rioja even shows fruit, but then there's the labelling being so odd, and do they even have an appellation system?

Both countries are very well regulated, as it happens, and the wines we look at are all at least DO status and higher. In terms of labelling, the trend for producers to now be the rock stars and to make wines from a mixture of indigenous and imported varieties means understanding the labels is a lot more straightforward. A little effort, and a reminder that it is what's in the bottle that counts, will go a long way towards adding breadth to your Iberian experience.

And it is what's in the bottle that counts; we are continually amazed at how much flavour, intrigue and class you get for your financial outlay. Even the more expensive wines offer extraordinary value, especially when lined up against some of the more high-profile international stars.

So, we swear that whatever your particular penchant is – red, white, portular or sherried – the wines we feature come from the best producers on the peninsula, the ones leading both these countries into international recognition, respect and demand. We hope you enjoy having a nose around.

It seems almost impossible to discuss any major wine region in Europe without having to deal with the phylloxera issue, and Rioja is no exception, even if their experience is slightly different than most. It wasn't until the early 20th century that the vines were ravaged by the nasty pestilence, but at the end of the 19th century, when the French were suffering from major phylloxera outbreaks themselves, they went on the lookout for new wine regions to explore. And they came in droves, or at the very least Peugeots, to Rioja.

Spicy, succulent, sweet, ripe fruit

Solar Viejo has sat high and proud in northern Rioja since 1937. Their 'least aged' red is a berry-burst of cherries and plums supported by typical Rioja notes of tobacco and cedar. Slightly spicy, succulent with sweet, ripe fruit, it's a right poppet, a princess even...





This shows a bit of terracotta around its deep red centre. Remarkably fresh, it's also a savoury, meaty expression, softly powerful with broad shoulders and a slightly furrowed brow. With sticks of liquorice and baskets of fruit, it is complex, full, deeply enjoyable.

Having revived flagging vineyards in the hill town of Briones in the Rioja Alta, the de Gregorio brother and sister team are hellbent on making heaven-sent Rioja and 'the purest expression possible.' Very impressive, deeply rich and concentrated, yet also ebulliently fruity. A stunning example of modern Rioja.

We care because? Well, mes enfants, the French impact on Rioja's winemaking tradition has been extensive. The first commercial bodegas were founded here as the French arrived, and they were modeled on the great Bordeaux châteaux. The French brought barriques with them (or at least the idea thereof), they brought winemaking skills and approaches that the Spanish simply hadn't seen.

But then came the Spanish Civil War, World War II and other nasties, and so, just as Rioja was getting good, its reputation faded somewhat. Not at home of course, and the Latin Americans lapped it up in the 1970s; but slowly, through the '80s and '90s, the rest of the world got the Rioja bug.

The extensive aging in oak, though, ensured the wines were too tannic for many of us, and it's only in the last decade or so that some almost anti-traditional, anarchic winemakers have turned history on its head and started to show wines with the suppleness and full-on fruit that we all know Tempranillo is capable of producing under the right conditions.

So, if your past experience is tannic, heavy reds, drink again, for the new Rioja is a very different beast to the one of old.

Sumptuous spice notes, gentle coffee and chocolate touches and rich, juicy fruit are integrated beautifully in this exquisite expression.



Bierzo is tucked away in the north-west of Spain, as much as you can tuck away 3000 square kilometres of DO vineyards. Our man, the groundbreaking Alvaro Palacios, has ridden into the region and said to the local, traditional growers (as politely as possible, no doubt) that the area and the local Mencía grape have quite some potential that they may, in fact, have not fully realised.

Along with nephew Ricardo and the highly-thought of, equally pioneering Dominio de Tares, Alvaro Palacios bought up sites long considered unproductive, replanted traditional varieties in terroir where they would thrive, and brought modern technology and thinking into an area that probably considered a burro pulling a plough to be highly mechanised.



This wine takes off in a thoroughly modern direction, all bright fruit, layered flavours and expertly massaged tannins. If you thought that Spanish reds were unforgiving, you're at the wrong confessional; this is approachable, seductive and satisfying in the extreme.

This concentrated, fruit-proud, meaty expression of 40-year-old Mencía vines, low yields and smart winemaking is a great example of why the revolution in Spain is so profound. With scores of 90 from both Parker and Spectator, you'd expect to pay way more.

We seem to say it about every Spanish region, but Ribera del Duero (the banks of the Duero) is one of Spain's most exciting wine regions. Located an hour's mule ride and a bit from Madrid, the cultivation of excellent reds from the Tinto Fino variety (Tempranillo by any other name) has gone on here for centuries, with the King's court happy to slosh them down their tunics and not share them with the world.

But since DO status was awarded in 1982, along with compulsory legwarmers for the cold winter nights, the region has come on in leaping bounds. The key here is the landscape; it is very, very high here, and despite searing summer heat, the altitude and the cool nights mean the grapes develop flavours and concentration that would just blow out otherwise.

The aromatics in particular can be swoon-inducing, with the great wines explosively heady, intoxicatingly exotic, spicy, sweet-edged and opulent. And the other thing we always say about Spain, of course, is that its wines offer extraordinary value. There is a depth and intensity to the bulk of these offerings that would command far more pesetas from your pink pockets if they came from, say, oh, I don't know, the Barossa, or Coonawarra.

But while the revolutions in these Spanish regions are becoming worldrenowned, the prices haven't quite yet caught up with the critics, leaving us, the consumer, to make hay. Or at least, a very tasty paella.

Wine wasn't being produced in this region before the pioneers at Protos came along; they were the first. By planting in the right soils and applying modern winemaking techniques, they have shown that vibrant young reds with just a touch of oak can be ours.

A collaboration between Mariano Garcia, a former top winemaker at the famed Vega Sicilia winery, and Javier Zaccagnini, former President of the governing body of the Ribera del Duero's AOC, this was always going to be something special. Everything at Aalto speaks quality. Underlining that, Parker doesn't hand out this sort of score lightly.



Named after Emilio's first-ever vineyard, this is a delightful little drop, made for your enjoyment nowish, not later. It sees a bit of French oak (bonjour!) but is defiantly unfiltered (au revoir!), the intense berry flavours lifted with coffee, spice and tobacco notes.

You don't really envisage Spaniards trudging their way home through thick fog, collar up, enthusiasm down, but up in the far north-west of the country, the climate is maritime; mild temperatures, buckets of rain and the odd pea souper. And while we're realigning our traditional perceptions of Spain as a winemaking nation, red wines virtually don't even feature up this way, either.

Indeed, this region's reputation, which is not inconsiderable - it was accorded DO status in 1988 - is largely forged on the fortunes of the Albariño grape. Planted by Cistercian monks in the 12th century, the variety produces lively, sometimes angular, sometimes more fleshy, mineral-tinged whites, wines that make a lot more sense when paired with fish, that being the cuisine around these parts.



fleshy, despite no wood being killed in the making of this vino, the

fruits are creamy apricots and peaches and crisp apples.



The tiny DOQ enclave of Priorat almost solely owes its existence to the vision of Alvaro Palacios. Only he knows what attracted him to the vertigo-inducing, black slate hillsides of the region, even more to actually buying a 'you won't get a tractor up there, boy' steep schist vineyard in 1993.

When he pulled out of his hat, however, the stunning L'Ermita (which Glengarry currently has in stock) and had it named one of the world's greatest reds, every Spaniard worth his salt was saying, 'oh yeah, Priorat, I'd thought about getting some land there...'

Not far from Barcelona, yet a million miles from most of what's produced nearby, the wines of Alvaro and another amazing producer we discovered, Pares Balta, will stun and surprise in equal measure. Worth noting that this is only the second region to qualify as a DOQ, the top tier of Spain's regional qualification.





produce three wines from Priorat, under the Gratavinum label. 50% Garnacha, 30% Cariñena, 10% Cabernet Sauvignon and 10% Syrah, there is a massive (fruit) attack swiftly followed by liquorice, cedar and graphite. An exquisitely rendered representation of pure terroir.

Although the GV5 sounds like the latest Alfa Romeo, it is in fact an explosive expression of everything Priorat. The intensely flavoured fruit gets a major winery work out, and density and critical mass are the result. With granite-like solidity and layers of flavour, you'll need to return again and again.



As we swivel back around to the south-east we encounter one of Spain's most interesting regions, and one that has, like many of the others, undergone a recent transformation of some significance. Spared phylloxera first time around, nature cruelly got them just as Vanilla Ice topped the charts. Indeed 1989 was an annus horribilis, but they've bounced back, using the possible disaster as an opportunity to plant carefully and regraft vines with some thought for the region's future.

Monastrell (Mourvèdre to us) accounts for over 85% of vines planted, but have a dig around, because behind the odd tin shed or hidden in a field, some mavericks are doing interesting things with non-traditional varieties, Merlot in particular proving to be quite okay with 40-degree summer days and zero-degree winter nights.

Syrah and Cabernet are producing interesting expressions, too. And you must check out Luzon's organic offering; modern winemaking never tasted so guiltfree. What do the, erm, bankers say? It's red but it's green?



Rich, generous, unoaked red

The label is so non-trad Spanish you'd be forgiven for thinking it were French or Italian. And the insides; well, the idea of a non-wooded Spanish red is almost heresy. Rich and generous and exquisitely structured, without a shred of oak coming near it.

Carchelo are fiercely modern; this blend of Monastrell, Syrah and Cabernet is probably still causing consternation in certain circles. With a capsule that looks like old-fashioned togs and a palate with more fruit than is decent at this price, resistance is, as they say, futile.



Cádiz, the town, is one of the oldest continually-inhabited cities in Europe, and if that dry statistic does nothing for you, it is also one of the most visually stunning. In wine terms, which are the terms in which all business should be conducted, it is part of the DO of Andalucía, the country's second biggest, and home, mostly, to sherry.

Thanks to the envelope-pushing personality of the likes of Vicente Taberner, wines other than the internationally-renowned fortifieds are poking their head above the sturdy parapet, and so the region has gone from being comfortable and predictable to, like so much of Spain, having a bit of a shake up.

The sherries we ship are from Valdespino, an old bodega and a worldrenowned one, their output covering all the sherry bases, from the scintillating and dry 'Inocente' (and we all were once) through the thick, lush, Pedro Ximenez dominated styles. Forget the dusty flagon on your pop's sideboard, this is the real deal, and an entire world of wine that just might open you up like a can of sardines. 2010, the year of new experiences, then.



# TIC AL Raiva

It's said that virtually every great wine region in the world has, at its heart, a great river. When the name of the river is the region itself, its significance is clear. The romance of the Douro River is that it winds its way from Spain, where it is the Duero, neatly threading together the Iberian Peninsula as a whole.

Of course the rather famous town of Porto lies on the same river, and for many of us, Portugal means port, period. However, some of the table wines being produced are very smart, the ubiquitous port grapes of Touriga Nacionale, etc. showing they can be massaged into excellent non-fortified expressions as well.

A selection of the port houses produce table wines alongside their fortifieds, while some new kids on the terraced block are table wine specialists alone, and have shown that all the rock breaking and back breaking may well be worth it.



#### Balance and power combined

A beautifully crafted cuvée, comprising mainly Touriga Naçionale and Touriga Franca from vineyards sited right on the river. The fruit has a delicious smoky character to it, the wine showing superb balance and barely restrained power. Broadly appealing, but unquestionably from the Douro.

Portuguese fruit, Spanish know-how

EM is better known for his Ribera del Duero wines, but under this banner comes a wine almost borne of stubbornness, a blend from both sides of the Douro/ Duero. Fleshy and broad as the river itself, it's a bold undertaking that has paid off handsomely.

Bairrada is a DOC appellation; carrying Portugal's highest legislative affixation means that there are some fundamental restrictions on yields, grape varieties used, alcohol levels, brand of 4WD to take the kids to the local school...

Just west of the Dao appellation and just south of Oporto, the region's reliable if historically anodyne reds were often blended into the ports made up the river, thus never gaining the opportunity for free expression of their own vibrant personalities, poor oppressed mites.

But with people like Luis Pato championing the prowess of the Bago variety, and backing that up with what's in the bottle, and a number of others in the region now looking forward, not back, we have yet another small but important appellation waving its own flag instead of someone else's.

Chewy, succulent, substantial reds are the order of the day, but check Luis' daughter Filipa's whites; a deft touch if ever there was one, and one that shows generalisations cannot be made about a region's output, despite what history may or may not point to. As Filipa says, 'I believe in the essential complementarity of tradition and innovation that is the reward of an open mind.'





## Rhône 2007 an impressive vintage

Wise and experienced winemakers tend to be cautious when it comes to making predictions about the quality of a vintage. They normally reserve judgement until all the grapes have been harvested. As the 2007 Rhône harvest approached, it was clear – judging by the back slapping and broad smiles – that the vintage was going to be special.

The 2007 delivered a near perfect growing season, characterised by dry, temperate conditions, particularly during August and the crucial month of September. The month was filled with hot sunny days, dry northern winds and cool nights beneficial to the slow, gradual maturing of the grapes.

The upshot is, the 2007 wines – from the most humble Vins de Pays to the greatest appellations – are uniformly excellent. The Côtes du Rhône wines are particularly good value; most are sourced from Southern Rhone, which experienced a season where everything fell into place. The resulting wines have excellent depth of fruit, great colour and supple but firm tannins.

Established in 1988, Grant Burge Wines have grown to become one of Australia's top ten privately-owned wineries.
