Look, he's our resident Frenchman; I mean, we had to pick him really, didn't we? And being a sporting nut, with the FIFA World Cup, the Tour de France and the Rugby World Cup, he had a few things to say, didn't he? What did he think France's chances were in the football? Time to right the ignominy of the Zidane head butt? A shrug of the shoulders, reminding you that anyone of French extraction can make a mere shrug say a thousand things.

But we're here to say a thousand things about wine, particularly French wine, given this month's theme. Thomas considers himself privileged to be in our Takapuna store, where the travelling proclivities of a large number of his clientele means less education and explanation is required regarding some of the more difficult notions of French viticulture and legislation. Furthermore, their experience of drinking French wine in Europe means these folk know what they want, and love talking about it.

'The people here are very knowledgeable, generally, and they're really interested in what we have on offer, and not just the expensive wines. If only I could persuade them to buy more red wine,' he muses, as Edith Piaf bemoans the skies above Paris all around us. 'The staff, they 'ate my music,' he tells me, 'but I can be a bit, you know, like a dictator.' I love it. He'd be excited, then, about the panoply of pleasures unwrapped within the pages of this wineletter.

'Brilliant! And it's great to have wines from the different regions, too. People here are always keen to try something new, especially once we start talking to them. And maybe we can follow the Tour de France through the wine regions; people around here are crazy about the race, coming in all the time, asking me if I've seen who's winning the last leg."

Bordeaux born and bred he may be, but relocated to our climes, Thomas ensures that his country's vinous treats are shared with evangelical zeal. Although, he insists he loves New Zealand wines equally. Well, almost. 'Of course, I mean, if people enjoy Sauvignon Blanc, that's okay...' Another shrug of the shoulders. Go see him this month; he knows his stuff, and delivers his knowledge with wit, verve and that French nonchalance that is not quite translatable, but very charming.

It is well documented that the aromatic components of Viognier are the last to appear in the ripening process. Hence the need for the fruit to hang out on the vine, while the viticulturist gets strung out in the tractor shed. 'Keep away from the creosote, Clive, the forecast is good...' Well, 2009 played right into their nervously shaking hands in the Bridge Pa; intense aromas of musk, florals and orange groves groove the nose, while the citrus-blessed palate is rich, thickly textured and showing immense staying power.

NAUTILUS

Nautilus Winemaker, Clive Jones

The expansion of wineries in Marlborough since the first Sauvignon Blanc was released in 1979 has been spectacular; at the last count there were 139 wineries in the region. The greatest expansion has occurred in the last decade, and many relative newcomers have, at best, experienced a mere handful of vintages. An exception is the family-owned Nautilus Estate, who celebrated their 25th vintage with the release of the 2009 Sauvignon Blanc.

That quarter of a century of experience with Marlborough's unique soils and growing conditions has enabled Nautilus to establish an enviable reputation as one of New Zealand's most consistent producers of premium quality wines, with exports now going out to 35 countries.

The company's premium wines are marketed as Nautilus, with a second range of fruit driven, value-for-money wines under the banner of the Twin Islands label. The fruit for both tiers is sourced from company-owned vineyards located in six Marlborough sub-regions. Some fruit is also selected from long-standing Marlborough growers.

Chief winemaker Clive Jones spent six years working in a West Auckland winery before joining Nautilus in 1998. Clive has also worked vintages in Oregon and with Domaine Dujac in Burgundy, which led to the development in 2000 of the company's dedicated Pinot Noir facility.

Clive is responsible for the production of both wine ranges, which includes the superb Nautilus méthode. Collectively, the Nautilus wines have won many significant medals and trophies.

The Cuvée Marlborough is a blend of 75% hand harvested Pinot Noir and 25% Chardonnay, bottle-aged for three years following the second fermentation. It is an elegant wine with a profusion of golden bubbles and a distinctive bouquet displaying floral and yeasty nuances. The Pinot Noir portion provides fullness to the rich, creamy palate, which finishes on a crisp, lingering note.

Soft summer fruit aromas and a touch of spice enhance this ready-to-drink, medium-weighted wine.





Opawa Marlborough Pinot Noir 2008

Opawa is named after the gravel-laden Opawa Vineyard surrounding the Nautilus winery. The wine was fermented on indigenous yeasts in the company's dedicated Pinot Noir production facility, with 50% matured in French oak barriques. It is a bright ruby-coloured wine with spice-edged strawberry and floral aromas on the nose. The mediumweighted palate has an attractive juicy character, supported by some subtle oak and a fine, lingering finish.

Factor in that we've demoted the dollars even further, and our insistence on only the freshest of stock and really, the notion of buying one of everything becomes one of impregnable logic.

Whether you're a yeasty, biscuity, leesy type or a fruit first, ask questions later kinda kid, it's time to live a little, wouldn't you say? Pop! Ahh, music.

Nice to be able to use the word 'plump' and not get skewered for it, for Charlie is indeed round of form, a warm, fleshy style with brazil nut toastiness, a toffeetasting creaminess and some weighty stonefruit notes just to fill out its oversized trousers, its tightening belt of finely wrought acid keeping all in perfect proportion.







SPAVKLING

It may seem ridiculous, heresy to some, even, to say there's more to French sparkling wine than Champagne. Peer beyond the borders, swivel your sights, and there, in a category quaintly named 'Other French Sparkling' are bottle fermented wines reflective of terroir, or the various Crémant wines like the Gisselbrecht below. These are not Champagne substitutes, they are wines of character and quality in their own right, many of which have the tradition and history of some of the Grand Marques. They just don't have the price tags.



Arrogant Frog

Lily Pad Pink Sparkling Rosé NV

A freshly delicious, faintly frivolous but resolutely charming sparkling rosé. Abundant in bounding Grenache strawberries and raspberries, while not in itself sweet, goes wonderfully with tarts of the same name.

Gisselbrecht Crémant d'Alsace Brut NV

Crémant is right; zut alors, Zal, the foam, the foam! Very fine bead, actually, beautifully buoyant in the glass, a glinting pale gold. Full-on nose of apples, flowers and candied fruit, with a mandarins soaked in alcohol/Cointreau character to get it over the line. Takes over your mouth, just moves right on in, finishing soft, seductive and sexy.

Saint-Meyland Méthode Traditionnelle Brut NV

Pinot and Chardonnay dominant, The Saint possesses that yeasty toastiness from the second ferment that provides weight, class, distinction and complexity. Poached pears, a hint of mint, some baked apples and a dry finish. Pedigree without the preposterous price.





LSACE

If Beaujolais has cause for complaint for being undervalued as a great French wine region, the producers of Alsace could probably get a petition heard at the UN on the same grounds. Anyone who has visited the region will vouch for its being one of the most stunning on the planet to grow grapes.

The wines, especially those from key small family producers, are mesmerising. The only thing lacking is a price to match. Even the labelling is easy to understand; you get the grape variety, the producer and then, if the wine concerned comes from one of the 51 permitted Grand Crus vineyards, it will have that vineyard name (e.g. Furstentum) full frontal as well.

Aromatic whites are the delight here; go for a swim and, if you can drag yourself from the pool of hedonistic delights, come up for air now and again for a bite. These wines benefit beautifully from being well paired with great foods.



Josmeyer Pinot Gris **2007**

Benchmark Pinot Gris

One of the more forward-looking producers this side of the Vosges, something one look at the non-traditional label will tell you. A benchmark Pinot Gris, this is how it's done; earthy, peachy fruit hinting at honey, lusciously textured with staggering length. But then again, they have a bit of a head start on us: 35-year-old vines and a vintage that saw them harvesting on the earliest date since the estate was founded back in '54.

Madonna and Britney? Scarlet and Sandra? Pullease. This, is the kiss.



Louis Sipp Alsace Pinot Gris **2006**

If you are feeling underwhelmed by Pinot Gris, then this may reignite your tired palate, and remind us all that four years on a good Gris is barely a wrinkle around the eye. Apparently, this excels when matched with 'country buffets'. How idyllic. White lace tablecloths, children cavorting... The clean, appley fruit aromas lead into a great texture that's deliciously weighty, yet taut and tart. There's a slight, charming hint of sweetness, but really, it's the texture that pulps your pipfruit.



Almost all of them sell to big co-operatives or negociants, of whom our feature artist, Georges Duboeuf, is the biggest, the best and the most innovative by a very long stick.

The appellation system that has followed us everywhere sees us deal with a Beaujolais AOC, then a Beaujolais-Villages appellation, and then, most highly regarded, the ten Beaujolais Cru vineyards, designated as extra-special due to their individual terroir. They deliver wines that are a unique expression of the Gamay grape, the region and of the increasingly sophisticated winegrowers and producers who are, in the words of the immortal poet, 'keeping it real'.

Fleurie is considered to be quintessential Beaujolais, lush and pure, with a soft silkiness that is overwhelmingly charming. Besieged beautifully by aromatics of violet, iris and rose, it is known as the Queen of Beaujolais.



Every great wine region is dominated by a great river, and while great rivers of okay reds flood from the region of the river Rhône, seductive streams of extraordinary wines, the equal of Burgundy and Bordeaux in their quality and mystery, also gush forth. As they used to say on The Magic Roundabout, you just have to know where to look.

To the north we have the glamour appellations, where names like Hermitage and Cote-Rôtie draw squeals of delight from Syrah enthusiasts and those who don't have to work the insanely-terraced hillsides, while the south flies the rustic and historically blood-stained flag of Châteauneuf-du-Pape, adding Grenache and Mourvèdre to its armoury. Let's try: it's the largest AOC area in France, with a staggering 86,000ha of vineyard plantings; 75% of the production is red; about 20,000 growers declare their output; around (we didn't have time to count them all) 60 million cases are produced annually.

See those numbers just get you going, and even knowing that the landscape, compared to, say, Alsace or Beaujolais, could be considered flat and lifeless, no one will listen to your whinings. Because this region is responsible for the world's greatest red wines, and a whole bunch more that are uniquely exceptional.

If anything Cabernet, Merlot, or Franc-like is your thing, as a winemaker, viticulturist or enthusiast, you know you must turn to the south-west and get tasting. Let the Jean E come-latelies from Australia and Chile try, but when the sun sets over the mudflats, as Sam Hunt once said, this is the global benchmark.



Superb cellaring potential

The Frey family, who bought this much revitalised Château in 2000, also bought Jaboulet, lock stock and barrel(s), six years later. Driven, innovative, and quality-focused folk. If that all sounds a tad passionless, be fooled not, this is wine with a big, red heart. Fat, fleshy, with great structure and superb ageing potential, it is very impressive, beautifully balanced and exquisitely made. Of this particular vintage, Parker actually heaved himself from his chair and said 'wow!', which, truly, is praise indeed.

RIBERA DEL DUERO

The Ribera del Duero region lies in the heart of Castilla y Leon, some 200 kilometres north of Madrid. Located at altitudes of between 700 and 850 metres, the vineyards stretch along the banks of the river Duero and across the rolling northern plateau.

The region enjoys an excellent viticultural climate during the growing season, the hot days mixed with cool nights delivering intensely flavoured, aromatic grapes. The soils, too, are well-suited to viticulture, consisting largely of clay and alluvial deposits near the river Duero and limestone in the higher vineyards. The dominant grape variety is the local clone of Tempranillo, known as Tinto Fino or Tinto de Pais. There is also Garnacha, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Malbec grown.

Although wine has been made in the Ribera del Duero for centuries, its potential was only realised in relatively recent years, the region granted its own DO status in 1982. This led to rapid expansion, and the introduction of modern methods, crop reduction and vineyard management. The wines can be rich, bold and yet restrained, while expressing a great sense of place.

Emilio Moro Finca Resalso 2007




