When I ask Jessica Leckie how long she's been managing the Dida's Food Store, she comes back quickly: 'January 18th, 2010.' So it was either memorable for being the worst day of her life or... 'I love it! It's so busy. It's just great.' Three strikes, then, all of 'em positive. And she's a positive bod herself, cheery, bright, enthusiastic and smart as she deals with the multifarious challenges managing the Food Store throws her way. 'Oh yes, it's challenging; the weekends especially are full-on and so are the people!' But when you've been the Sous Chef at the London Hilton and run teams of chefs, what's a few hundred people fronting for flat whites really going to do to your composure?

A chef by trade, Jess went to England to pursue training opportunities she couldn't realise here and, as she puts it, 'learned amazing things from people with unreal backgrounds.' Her recreational travel – eating and drinking through Europe's gastronomic capitals – really iced her OE cake and, having married in the UK, Jess and her beau headed to Brisbane, where she head-cheffed in a small restaurant for eighteen months before coming back here and thinking, hmm, what now?

'I wanted to move out of the kitchen, my heart just wasn't in it 100% and I don't think you can cook unless it is. Food needs love and attention; you can look at food that's being presented and straight away tell if it hasn't had that.' High standards and a soul; just what we needed. Jess was concerned that a lack of straight business skills might preclude her from the role of managing what is, essentially, a stand alone business, but I've always believed that some things can be taught – profit and loss, how to make the mouse stop blinking – and some can't: enthusiasm, heart, ambition. And her experience overseas has been pivotal in communicating our wide range of local and imported exotic produce.

'True! People love it when you can put a context around what they're buying, so you tell them how you see Parma ham just hanging up in the street in Europe.' It's gratifying that they are interested in the background of what they're buying? 'Oh, definitely. And having a few anecdotes seems to make it all come alive for them somehow. We're inundated with suppliers here showing off all sorts of amazing stuff. I'll also go for a wander down Ponsonby Road, just to see what's come in to certain places, what's new. And I read loads of foodie mags.' Of course.

'But, you know, while I love all the European glamour goods, we have to push our own great produce, too. We've come so far in New Zealand just in the eight years I've been away. The cheeses, especially, that we produce here now are amazing. After all,' she says sagely, finally pausing, 'if we don't, who will?'

Shame on you.





The Donaldson Family have long been involved in Canterbury winegrowing, with Ivan Donaldson planting a small vineyard in Halswell in 1976. Those early, tentative steps culminated in the establishment of Pegasus Bay when the family planted their first vineyard in Waipara in 1986.

Pegasus Bay is a family business; there are surely few wineries in New Zealand that can claim to have seven members of the family actively involved in every aspect of the winery's operations. Ivan and Christine, along with their sons and their respective wives, manage the vineyard, the winemaking, the restaurant and the marketing.

With input from Ivan, the Pegasus wines are made by eldest son Matthew and his wife, Lynette. They have adopted a minimal intervention approach to the winemaking at all stages of production.

The Pegasus range is produced exclusively from estate-grown fruit, the wines particularly expressive of their unique terroir, while the wines under the Main Divide label use fruit sourced from Canterbury and other South Island growers. These are typically great value and food friendly.

Pegasus also produces a selection of reserve wines that are made in small quantities and only in the best years. The company's wine selections have won many accolades throughout the world, including an outstanding 5-star winery rating from Robert Parker.

Added to that, the opera-themed restaurant was named - for the third year running - Cuisine's Winery Restaurant of the Year. Pegasus Bay is the jewel in Waipara's crown, and one of New Zealand's stellar operators.

I see they just celebrated twenty-five years of Cloudiness, with a degustation dinner that would make you turn an environmental shade, if you weren't there. Nobis cosundrum, as the ole Latin lads would say, here's a chance to take a dip in the beautiful pool and remember why this winery has had such a huge impact: ultra high standards. For quarter of a century. Compromise? Banish-ed.



Italian wine has come a long way (on the truck, round the frightening one-lane hillside road, down to the wharf and, ohhhh, it's lunchtime... sorry chaps, wait another day, get it loaded on the boat...), by which we mean that the world's largest producer by volume is now putting quality ahead of quantity, and has cleaned up its legislative act so that there are at least some controls as to what's planted where, how much is harvested and what gets slapped on the label.

Like George Best, Italy is naturally gifted, but its huge consumption of ordinary product was sounding the death knells, at least internationally, if not in their own mind. Step in technological advances, a new breed of winemakers unafraid to flout tradition and a playful approach to some new varieties and, á la Chile, á la Spain, Italy has come careening out of the shadows on its Vespa saying, 'we have more brilliant terroir and hillsides and sunlight than anyone, and we're gonna use it.'

There. Twenty years in two hundred words. Following, from across a few of the regions, are some of the serious top end and some everyday tasty stuff to tempt you to do what we all must: cook something simple and flavoursome and then pop an Italian to go with it. Ciao? Chow.



The encircling Alps shape Piedmont's topography, and thus its wines, to a marked degree. For those who seek out the brooding Barolos and Barbarescos, the 'little sweetie' Dolcetto wines, and the wonderful, low-key, highly exciting sparkling wines, the towns of Alba and Asti are the ones to set your GPS for.

The approach in Piedmont is more French-influenced, with a long tradition of judicious barrel use, and a much limited (and pronounceable) round of varieties compared with elsewhere. The reds here generate similar gasps from the press as Bordeaux, and often similarly celestial pricing, for good reason. Like a great claret, a good Barolo will keep, unfold and deliver boundless joy for decades.

Ever a beat ahead of the rest of the brigade, Piedmont has always been a pretty, modern girl, but it, too, has benefited from technological advances and an eye on the international market. Have a look, then, don't be shy, Guy...



fruity fragrance opening onto a wine that is soft, ripe and seductively pleasant in typical Dolcettian charmy,

not smarmy, fashion.





Along with the Monferrato Hills, the Langhe Hills account for 90% of Piedmontese production. Batie is 'Baptism' in Italian, the growers judging this wine as being good enough for that momentous event. Nebbiolo here is intense, spicy sweetness with a Bond-like smoothness, the oak controlled and supportive, allowing the fruit to shine.

Gagliardo SERRE Barolo DOCG 2005

Gianni Gagliardo married into the family vineyards of Paolo Colla and, from knowing nino about vino, Gianni now runs the whole shop. Stylistically he shifted gears from big old Barolo style to big new Barolo style, so this is plummy fruit and spice with oak in the back seat, rather than the reverse. Less monolithic, more beatific,

á la Bordeaux; you just have to know where to look. Two prime sites contribute hand-picked fruit that sits for thirty long months in oak before the Gaggles even take a peek. It'll peak around 2018; panic not, the slow evolution is already worth indulging in now. Buy a box, watch it grow.

New to NZ and thus to all of us, this is discreetly labelled, expertly executed. Typical of the variety, she's sweet fruit and spice, all things nice, all things good and not a skerrick of wood. Floral, hauntingly perfumed (is that an echo of Burgundy I sniff before me?) this is so charming it's disarming. Not meaty or weighty, yet it boasts incredible presence and persistence, finely-grained and perfectly judged tannic support, and a lovely, sumptuous finish.

Fragrant, nutty, richly textured white

Funny wee beast, is Arneis, and while Piedmont is its rightful home, the more savvy of you would've noticed a few local expressions slipping into the pages of the wineletter now and again. This, the blueprint, citrusly fragrant, slightly nutty, richly textured, inviting and rewarding. Like Chardonnay without the wood and the ubiquity. Great tangy finish, too, even if it went all over my striped pyjamas. Don't drink on the divan, Dean.

Not orecchiette pasta, this is serious stuff from the Prune-ohs, indeed prune/black cherry in character, with some swerves to the violet side of town and a switchback of tannin just to remind you that you're messing with Barolo's birthplace here. Solid, not stolid, though, and as earthy as the jokes at the Dannevirke RSA.





You know the Fontanafredda hunting lodge (1878ish) is still functional, so if you fancy some wild boar... which would be perfect with this intense, monumental wine, an expression that at nigh on a decade old is barely stretching its, um, hooves. There's a rose blossom character amongst the dank earth, then the fruit and spice surge forth, the tightening grip of tannin barely restraining the concentration of flavours.

So incestuous, those Italian winemakers, with Daniel Drucco, winemaker here at Freddo, coming all the way from... Prunotto. Buy a passport, Dan! See the world. A curvaceous, uplifting expression of the wily Barbera grape that's six years on from vintage yet scintillatingly fresh. It shows that wondrous varietal mix of spice and savoury, sweet fruit and well-defined tannin, a coffee toastiness and a request for some rare beef. And perhaps another bottle my good man.









Veneto is a fiercely independent region up in the north-east, similar, in a way to the Basque area of Spain, only the Venetians tend to pack lunch rather than Semtex. Their own language, their own republic for a goodly long time, and proud protectors of a region overflowing with natural resources so abundant they make Hawke's Bay look like the Russian steppes.

Our concern are the hills that rise from the richly blessed Po Valley (Risotto Central), where internationally recognised regions like Soave and Valpolicella deliver uncomplicated, approachable wines. Ten percent of Italy's production is sourced from these very spots. Remember that it's ten percent of a helluva lot, and you'll realise that this is a very important region.

History cast a lot of these wines into the ordinary basket, but don't be fooled; great sites and careful viticultural management are producing some interesting expressions of the traditional grape varieties, and some non-traditional ones as well.

However, for maximum flavour and approachability and minimum outlay (especially when you've spent the day wearing down your Manolos being mesmerised by architecture), a swift Soave and a seafood starter, or plentiful pasta and a vibrant Valpol, will bring much enjoyment. For a heartbeat, you may even believe that it's only the sun, and not Venice itself, that's sinking. Not drowning, waving.



Electrically bright in the glass, it's sweetly scented with delicious cherry fruit kazooming, careening, grabbing hold of your senses and giving them more than a wee shake. Cheery, breezy, like an unexpected conversation: not overly significant in itself, but somehow making your day a little more exciting and enjoyable.



GOING DOWN IN VENICE

Pasqua LE COLLEZIONI Montepulciano d'Abruzzo DOC 2009

Montepulciano being the grape, Abruzzo in Central Italy near the dreamy Adriatic being the region and Pasqua the producers. 85 years in Veneto, Pasqua slot historically and stylistically into this little section of the north-east. Piercingly fresh fruit, waves of flavour and great structure, especially since it was fermented in stainless, not a shred of wood sacrificed for your pleasure.

This is a peach, citrus-drenched, with almond nuances and a canopy of tropical treats to shelter beneath while you search for your swizzle stick. Funny how it's never your own lap that it falls into. Try with risotto. PASQUA Pasqua VALPOLICELLA Valpolicella DOC 2008 was \$20.50 now \$14.90

Much style for little outlay, that's our collective response to this. Tuscany throngs with culinary tourists, and plenty get guided from our very own rocky shores to feast on cheese and wine and olive oil before turning to the more substantial offerings available. And why not? While Tuscany is blessed beyond measure with a climate that favours the plentiful production of all things good to eat and drink, in the last couple of decades, with the emergence of Super Tuscan reds and serious upgrades on the Chianti front, the vinos have improved out of sight.

So focus, now, and check out the brilliant selection that follows. From powerhouse global monoliths Antinori to the Castello mob (oops) who trace their roots back beyond the Middle Ages, these wines taste of the terroir and hint at the heady hillside heights that can be achieved through vigour, rigour and modern winemaking meeting centuries of local viticultural knowledge. Pizza and pasta wines these are not. Or at least, not only.

In similar fashion to the French, if you unpick the seams in the regional viticultural pockets across Italy, you'll find local sparklings being made. Asti is the most internationally recognised region for bubbles, along with Veneto, thus our focus. Forget Champagne, or even our own flavoursome methodes, Italian sparklings are made – and drunk – differently. Varieties and terroir make them as similar to our MCs as a butterfly is to a bucket. But these are generalisations as whopping as those being told by the Acked Partee. These wines are about pleasure. Languid, lingering, lunchtime or early evening-derived pleasure. They're instant gratification ratification: the Pleasure Party. Now that gets our vote.



In typical Prosecco fashion, this charms the pants off you while stealing your shoes, and somehow you forgive it and come back for more. Why? Irresistible and typical white peach patterns are drawn hazily in its aromatic sky, with some crushed grapefruit to touch of the slight puffs of sweetness perfectly. Lightly frizzante, highly rewarding, and brilliant for Bellinis, the WHO recommended drink of 2010 (something to do with peaches and Vitamin C, 'parently). Bottoms up, but don't bottom out.

Driving south on Highway 5 from Taupo to Napier, the first sign that you have reached Hawke's Bay wine country is the welcoming sight of vineyards lining the road along Eskdale and leading to Bay View. Here, tucked into the hillside is the Esk Valley winery, one of the leading establishments of the Hawke's Bay wine region.

The outward appearance of the winery is unimposing; built in the mid-1930s by Glenvale, the buildings would not win any architectural awards; but what comes out of them has gathered awards and accolades by the score. The winery and vineyards were purchased by Villa Maria in 1987, and though the winery was extensively modernised, the strong concrete building at its centre was retained. Today, it remains at the heart of the operation and is arguably the oldest working winery in the country.

Senior winemaker, Gordon Russell: 'Winemaking doesn't much more hands-on than hand-plunging the red ferments in the original 75-year-old concrete tanks. The cellar maybe historic, but the wines are modern.' Esk Valley's wines are made naturally, using selected growers and the company vineyards in Hawke's Bay and Marlborough. 'Our wines are made in the vineyard; as they get older, we're learning more about what they can deliver,' says Gordon.

With Spain's natural climatic propensity (heat), it's a matter of trimming your viticultural sails rather than unfurling your spinnaker, so to speak, to catch every available ray. When you consider that the very same varietal that's harnessed here makes jammy, insoluble Rioja, you'd have to wonder how they do it. The freshness, vigour and crisp acidity are a wonderland; that they combine with some genuine presence and palate weight is too much for one heart to bear.
